Saints Have 4 - 4 Record After Dropping 2 Games on Week-end



had a tough weekend in Nova Scotia, as they lost games to Acadia's Axemen, and the St. F.X. A-Men. At Acadia, the score was 84-63, at X, 110-91.

The Saints were leading both games late in the second quarter, but ran into early foul trouble, which caused two of the starters to retire prematurely.
