


"THE KID" Inquires

"RAPE" She Cried Hopefully

Reliable sources within the walls of Marian College have indicated recently that some girls have requested that due to a lack of T.L.C., the more viril men on campus should scale the walls of the building and spend the night in their residence. It is believed that this renewed aggression and forwardness on the part of the Marian College girls was sparked by an incident during Carnival week when a large number of girls were not asked to the Ball. It is also thought that a great number of girls also felt shortchanged because the

last assault on Marian College in May of 1967 fell through because of clerical interference. Given this feeling of neglect prevailing within the walls of Marian, it is easy to see how last week's incident was the straw which broke the camel's back.

Preparations for the requested assault are already in the making. Extension ladders, ropes, and other paraphernalia are presently being tested so as to make the scaling of the walls as easy as possible. Reports indicate, however, that there is one major problem which may hold back the proceedings for

several months. The bodily appetites of the ordinary girl in Marian College have been held in suppression for so long by the tight supergoes formed in early childhood, and maintained by force in the Residence, that their bodies keep rejecting the birth control pills distributed to them for the planned event. All is not lost, however. Authorities from the men's residences revealed that the bodily rejection of the pills is a natural response when one considers the upbringing of these girls. As encouragement they suggested that a constant effort on the part of the girls to lead a more immoral life would eventually make their bodies receptive to these control devices. One step that might be taken with regard to this case would be to wear slacks to class in sub-zero weather. If these suggestions on the part of other men are carried out successfully, it is expected that the storming of Marian College might be executed some time in early May of '68. The requested assault would be somewhat delayed and would not satisfy their immediate needs but it would enable them to celebrate the first anniversary of the taking of Marian College.

QUEBEC, WHAT'S HAPPENING

Qu'est-ce que c'est la problème à Québec?

The Montreal Seminar on Quebec Affairs was called to answer this question and to attempt to find a common ground where "les Québécois" and the rest of Canada might meet to discuss their differences. McGill has always been considered the stronghold of the rich English minority in Montreal and for this, among other reasons, seemed the ideal place to inquire into the situation.

Before the seminar had progressed very far, one fact became clearly evident — the French students in Quebec are not interested in what happens to Canada in the event of Quebec's separating. They are Québécois first and Canadians second. Although the word separatist has given way to "independentiste", the strength of their resolution has not abated. There is a strong awareness among them, as among Levesque and his followers that Quebec has never received its due in Confederation and is tired of the whole deal. "We've waited a hundred years" said Marc Briere, independentiste M.P. "We can't afford to wait any longer."

In Levesque's new book *Option Quebec* which was released while the seminar was

in progress, we can find the independentiste's solution to Quebec's problems. They want an independent state not an associate-state relationship between Quebec and the rest of Canada, an arrangement whereby certain things such as money, defence, duties would be common to both but where Quebec could decide as a free and equal member of the partnership in which she now stands.

The problem of Quebec is aggravated by the almost country-wide indifference of the other provinces to her demands. One indication of this general apathy may be seen in the fact that even in the very large universities with thousands of students enrolled, there was apparently not one outside Quebec where as many applied to go to the Seminar as there were here in our small university. We generally consider university students to be the ones most concerned with such problems. If this is so there is certainly a shocking lack of interest across the country as to the survival of Canada as a nation.
