U of T To Have Four New Colleges

The four new student residences planned for the University of Toronto will be more than residences. They will be separate colleges, each with its own principal and registrar. Tutorial staff will be provided by cross-appointments from University teaching departments. Students of the various faculties will live together. In this way, it is hoped, some of the evils of bigness can be counteracted. Dr. Frank E. W. Wetmore, Professor of Chemistry and Associate Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science, has been appointed Principal of the first, as yet unnamed, residential college, effective July 1st. The college is expected to begin operations in 1963.

The biannual conference of the MGIDL was held at Mt. St. Bernard's, Antigonish, N. S., Saturday, April 7, 1962. St. Dunstan's was represented by Dorothy Morris and Mary McCardle. Congratulations go to Elaine for her new position, and to Elaine and Ellen for their debate against Mt. St. Bernard's. Although they lost, they displayed St. Dunstan's fighting spirit; besides, we can't win them all.

Overseas Institute Of Canada

This new, private organization has been established "to mobilize Canadian efforts in educational and technical assistance to developing countries, particularly those within the Commonwealth and those where the first language is French". It plans to "collaborate with and work through governments, universities, corporations and other interested bodies in Canada as well as some international organizations". The Institute is a constituent part of the Bon Echo Foundation. Officers are: President — Francis Winspear; Secretary — Msgr. Jacques Garneau; Honorary Treasurer — Walter Koerner; Chairman, Administrative Committee — Robert Wilson; Executive Secretary — J. R. Kidd. The Executive Secretary's office is at 56 Sparks Street, Ottawa 4. One of the first acts of the Overseas Institute will be to hold a conference on Canadian overseas aid, jointly sponsored by the University of Western Ontario, the Canadian Institute of International Affairs and the Institute. It is tentatively planned for May, and will be held at Middlesex College, University of Western Ontario, London. Attendance will be by invitation only.
