We welcome this lively young envoy from the North Bay Collegiate and Vocational School to our department. It is a scholarly magazine, special departments being devoted to German and French, besides the usual English section.

In the literary section we feel a delightful touch of the north in "A Week in a Hunting Camp," and Grace Harris' beauty filled "Sights Along a Northern Trail."

But the humour section we considered altogether too long and confused. If the work of the various forms were

compressed into half the space it would be more readily appreciated.

THE MEMORARE

Mount St. Bernard's College in Antigonish can claim the honor of publishing the largest and best appearing magazine we have received from any Maritime college. Its appeal for those who were privileged to see it can be explained by the fact that it comes from a ladies' college and contains many pictures of college activities; a great deal of its space is devoted to the publication of the jubilee reunion that took place there recently, not to the neglect of literature, however, which occupies a commanding section.

The distinctive mark of the *Memorare* is its intense religious atmosphere produced by several religious poems, and the exclusion of humour.

THE CHRISTIAN FAMILY

We find it impossible to complete this year's work without saying a few words on the best mission publication we receive. The Christian Family is published by St. Mary's Mission House, Techny, Illinois. Verse is wisely limited, and humour is unwisely omitted. The exchange section is much better than most of those we have seen. More power to it!

magazines. It is really a very creditable performance on the part of the students of Bishop's College, Lennox-ville, P. Q. Any student who has spent a night in writing a composition to which he has consequently become very much attached, and who receives it back from the critic "with harsh scorn" penciled on every page, would appreciate the "Ode to a Composition." We have all experienced the disillusionment expressed in the last two lines:
