Saint Dunstan's Hockey team captured the P.E.I. Intercollegiate champions by beating Prince of Wales Collegians 7-4 and 7-5 in two highly contested games in a best of three series. In both games, Saints had to hold off late third period rallies by P.W.C. to take the victory.

The first game, which was played at the local rink, was only in its infant stage when Bob Marshall roared in to beat Howatt, after taking passes
