



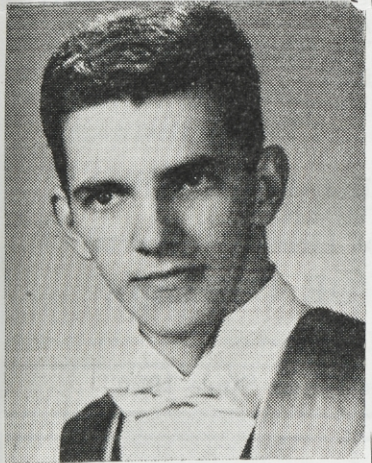
Anna Maria MacAdam — Arts

"Venit, vidit, vicit."

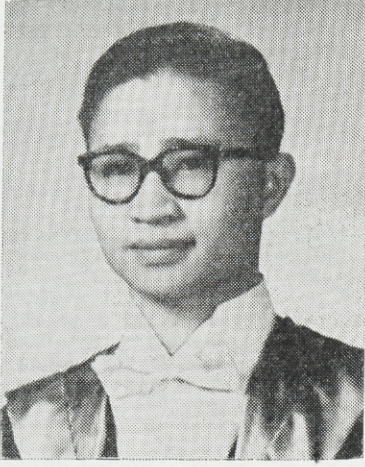

Basil Alyre Gallant—Science

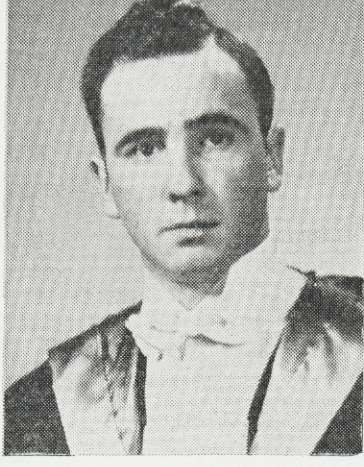

"Friends are man's most precious possession"

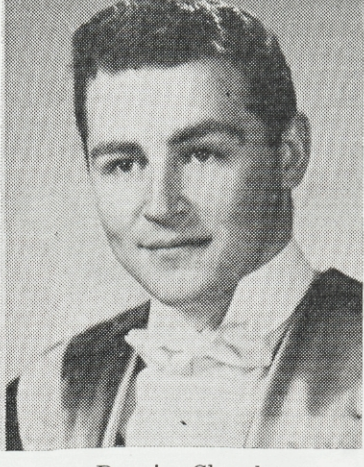

To a man optimistic in his outlook and with a good word for every friend we say, "May you have every success in your chosen career."

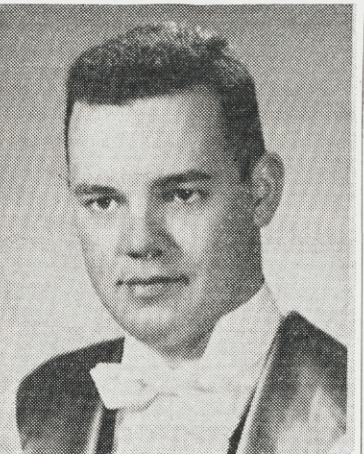
Dennis Clough

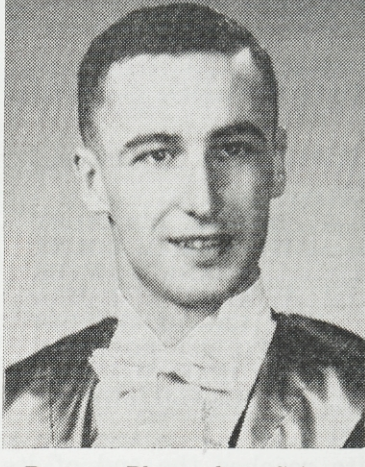
James Kimball Blanchard — Arts

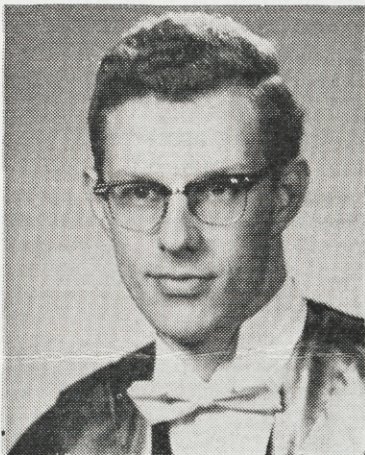
Kimball's plans for the future are in the field of education. His many friends wish him every success in his chosen profession.

His plans for the future include marriage in September and then off to Tech. To Bert and Mary we wish happiness and success.

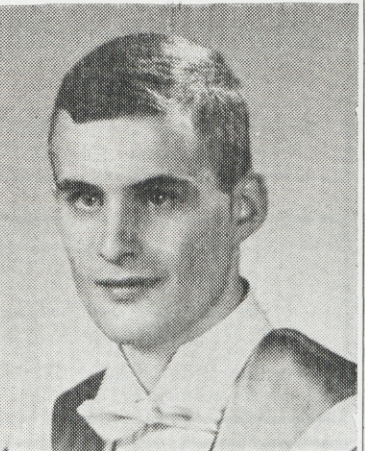


Richard John Ays — Science

Dick leaves St. Dunstan's with his Science degree and best wishes from all his friends for success and happiness in the future.

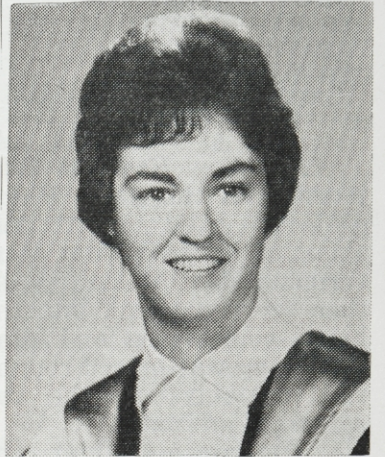
Jacques Louis Cote

Ernestine Paula Macdonald

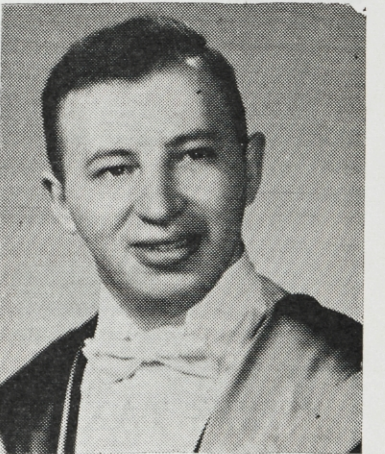
