


## IN MEMORIAM

Rev. A. B. MacDonald, D.D., died in Calgary in early April. Dr. MacDonald graduated from St. Dunstan's in 1899, studied Theology in Rome, and after his ordination in 1903 was appointed to the staff of St. Dunstan's College where he taught for the ensuing ten years. Dr. MacDonald was a student of history and political economy, and the pages of the first four volumes of **Red and White** reflect the wide scope of his ideas. In 1913 he went to Winnipeg where for some time he was editor of the **Northwest Review**. He later went to Calgary Diocese. He was a chaplain with the Canadian Army during the last years of World War I. He returned to Calgary after the war and has laboured there in many capacities since that time. Students who were here during his time remember him as a scholar and a cultured gentleman. *Lux aeterna, luceat ei, Domine!*



## ATHLETICS

MacAdam, faculty representative attended the annual meeting of the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union held at Sackville on April 1 and 2. No new changes were put into effect during this meeting. One of the more important matters dealt with was the drawing up of a football schedule for next fall.

In the finals of the City Hockey League the Saints lost out to the Navy in a very close, best out of three, series. The two teams were very evenly matched and the best hockey seen here this season took place in this series. ### CITY HOCKEY LEAGUE FINALS

The games, which the Saints played in the regular league and in the semi-finals, have been reported in the fall and winter issues of the **Red and White** this year so only a short resume of the finals will now be given.

On March 17 the Saints defeated the Navy 11—7 in the opening game of the City Hockey League finals. Both teams played a good brand of hockey but the Saints showed greater ability around the net to defeat their opponents by a margin of four goals. Wildor Houde and Jerry McQuaid each scored three goals for the Saints while Reg Rodgers, captain of the S.D.U. team followed with two.

On the following night the Navy evened up the series with a 6—5 victory in overtime. At the end of regulation time the two teams were tied 4—4 and at the end of the first overtime period it was tied 5—5. However, in a sudden death second overtime period Dowling secured the game for the Navy by scoring unassisted shortly after the period opened. The Saints' goals were scored by Houde(2), Mahar, Deighen, and Bernard.



On March 23 the Navy captured the Dr. F. C. Dougan trophy, emblem of the City Hockey League supremacy, by defeating the Saints 10—9. At the end of the first period the Navy held a 6—2 lead. The Saints, however, fought back strongly and tied the score early in the third period only to lose out in the final minutes by one goal. Joe Mahar and Cart MacDonald showed up well for the Saints as the former scored three times while the latter scored four.

### EXHIBITION HOCKEY GAME

As part of the I.S.S. campaign to raise funds to bring a D.P. student to St. Dunstan's next fall the Saints Senior hockey squad played an exhibition encounter with St. Francis Xavier which ended in an 8—8 tie. The game was one of the best of the season with neither team able to gain a decided edge over the other for any length of time.

### INTRAMURAL HOCKEY

### EXHIBITION GAMES

In an exhibition game with Recce on March 20 the Saints dropped a close 53—49 decision. The Saints started slowly and were unable to overcome the early lead taken by the Recce squad. O'Connor was top point-getter for the S.D.U. squad with 13 points.

At Chatham, New Brunswick on April 8 the S.D.U. squad easily defeated the St. Thomas basketball team 36—15. Buckless lead the Saints with 18 points.

On the following day after the Chatham game the Saints moved down to Sackville where they dropped a close decision to a team from Mount Allison. The game was closely-contested with the Red and White squad losing out by a score of 56—47.

### ISLAND PHYSICAL FITNESS BASKETBALL LEAGUE GAMES

The following are the games played by the Saints, and which have not been previously reported.

On February 26 a scheduled game was awarded to the Saints when the R.C.A.F. squad failed to appear for the encounter.

In their final game of the regular schedule the Saints consolidated second position in the league by defeating the Schurman basketball team 62—38. The S.D.U. boys had very little trouble overcoming the Summerside squad and the outcome of the game was never very much in doubt. Buckless and Reardon lead the Saints with 20 and 13 points respectively.

### ISLAND PHYSICAL FITNESS BASKETBALL PLAY-OFFS

The Saints took the first game of a two game total-point semi-final series with the R.C.A.F. team from Summerside 51—42. At the end of the first half the Saints were behind but a sustained drive during the second half gave them the victory. Buckless with 17 points and O'Connor with 14 led the Saints.



The second and final game of the semi-finals was played at the Summerside airport on April 4. The Flyers won a close 47—46 victory. The teams were very evenly matched and both games of this series were very closely contested with the Saints taking the series by only 9 points. Buckless led the Saints with 19 points.

In the opening game of the finals the St. Dunstan's squad handed the Recce team their first defeat of the Season by downing them 70—46. In the first half neither team was successful in gaining a decided advantage and at half time the Saints held a slim 25—22 lead.

The Red and White boys took charge, however, in the second half and outscored their opponents by 21 points. Buckless was top-scorer of the game with 23 points, followed by Michelson with 20. Roche and Reardon of the Saints came next with 17 and 15 points respectively.

On April 11 the S.D.U. squad clinched the Island Physical Fitness Basketball League Championship by overcoming the Recce squad 50—38. This victory gave the championship to St. Dunstan's in two straight games. The Saints took an early lead in the game and were never headed. Top scorers for the Saints were Buckless with 13 points and Roche with 9. Michelson and Peters led the Recce squad with 10 points.

The Second Saints' basketball team has also engaged in several contests this season and at present are undefeated.
