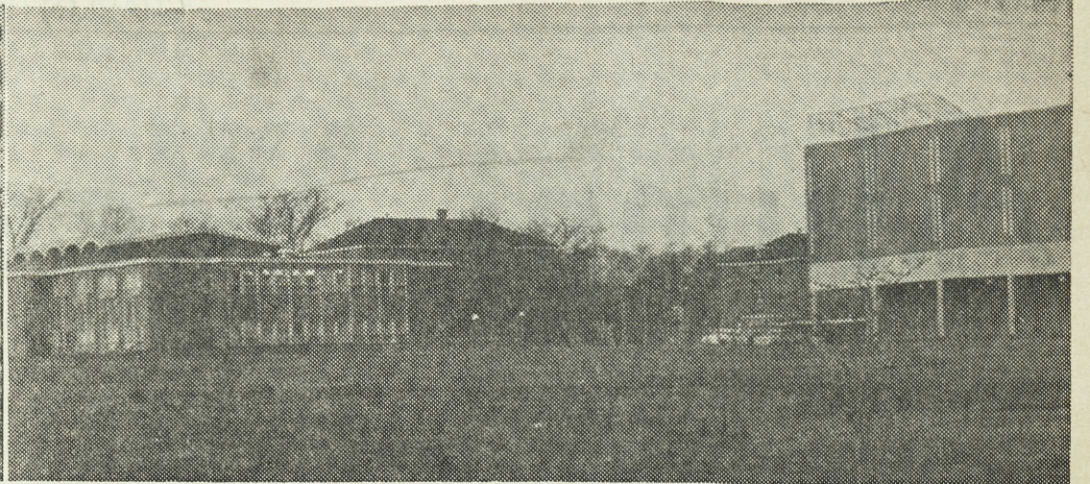

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WARD EXPRESSES REGRETS AT WITHDRAWAL FROM CUS

In a letter to Students' Union President Charley McMillan, Doug Ward, President of the Canadian Union of Students, expressed his regret that S.D.U. has withdrawn from CUS.

In his letter, dated November 2, Mr. Ward stated: "Perhaps the most disturbing aspect of this is that although we had the opportunity to talk personally at St. Dunstan's and its relation to the Union only two weeks ago, you did not find it opportune at that time to express to me the views which you have expressed since then. The Union certainly regrets the loss of a member, but more personally I sincerely regret that we were not able that weekend to establish the kind of dialogue in which the real issues could come out and be dealt with in the open."

PEI Youth May Soon Vote at 18

Prince Edward Island's new Liberal government may lower the voting age in provincial elections to 18, but the drinking age will remain at 21.

Premier Alex Campbell announced recently his government will introduce legislation next spring to lower the voting age.

If passed, it will make the Island Canada's second province (Quebec is the other) to lower the voting age to 18. In Alberta, the voting age is 19.

But the drinking age will not be lowered in P.E.I. "We are not at this time considering the lowering of the drinking age," Premier Campbell said.

The Premier continued to say, "Of course, it is open to our future consideration; but, as far as I'm concerned, it's more important our young people have a say in government affairs than it is to enjoy the privileges of the bar."

Lawson Hunter, President of the Association of Atlantic Students, had this to say about S.D.U.'s withdrawal from CUS: It was most disappointing to withdraw from CUS. I was even more disappointed to read in the Red and White that you have supported St. Dunstan's withdrawing from CUS. I feel that you have made a regrettable mistake. Surely CUS cannot be judged on a dollar and cents basis. The money aspect seems to be your only criterion for withdrawing from CUS. I am pleased that you are staying in A.A.S. (The Association of Atlantic Students). However, I do feel this membership will be meaningless now that you have withdrawn from CUS. Therefore, I urge you to review the entire situation at the earliest possible time."

S. D. U. Hosts Liberal Clubs

St. Dunstan's Liberal Club was host last Saturday and Sunday to a Maritime Student Liberal Think Conference. The conference, called "Charlottetown II" was held at the Basilica Recreation Centre and was attended by young Liberal thinkers from all the universities in the Maritimes.

Miss Mary Cullen, Charlottetown II Co-ordinator, told the Red and White this was the first Maritime University Liberal meet ever held on the Island.

The conference was set off with a keynote address by Dr. Mark R. MacGuigan, Professor of Law, Osgoode Hall Law School and York University. Dr. MacGuigan, in the challenging and forceful manner, told the students that they could exert tremendous power and pressure on political thought in Canada but in the past they had wasted too many opportunities. He said that a regional conference with the emphasis on thinking was an effective way for students to enact their role as a policy pressure group.

Policy workshops were held Saturday afternoon. Each student chose one of three commissions in which to participate. The commissions were initially addressed by prominent resource persons in each area. Professor Robert E. Carter, head of the philosophy department, P.W.C., spoke on education. Mr. Hugh B. Armstrong, President of the P.E.I. United Nations Association, spoke to

Alumni Weekend Set To Go

The Committee said, "In doing this the committee did not mean to be restrictive, but it would be easier for those nearer to attend the homecoming. It is hoped, however, that many others outside the province will attend, and a sincere welcome is extended to all Alumni of

St. Dunstan's."

In a statement to the Red and White, Charley McMillan, Students' Union President at St. Dunstan's, said: "It is the hope of the Students' Union, as well as that of the Alumni Association, that as many members of the faculty, alumni and student body will participate in the weekend events."

Considerable work has been put into the planning of the Alumni Weekend, but the success of the project will depend to no small degree on the co-operation and enthusiasm of everyone concerned."

Clancy Brothers Perform Sun.

The feature attraction of the Alumni Weekend will be the performance of the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem Sunday night. The Clancys, who made their P.E.I. debut last January at the St. Dunstan's University Winter Carnival, sold out to a capacity crowd — despite the worst weather of the winter.

Tom, Liam and Pat Clancy hail from Tipperary. Tommy Makem is from County Armagh, Ireland. They have appeared at night clubs and singing halls in most major cities of Canada and the United States, and are a regular feature on such big name television shows as the Dean Martin and Ed Sullivan Shows.

Since their last performance at St. Dunstan's, they have ap-

peared in cities all over the world, including Toronto, London, San Francisco and Dublin. Last summer, on a trip to their native Ireland to renew material and old friends, they taped a show for the B.B.C. which will be shown this fall.

They are popular for their zest on stage, their sincerity, their nationalist flavour, and their outstanding talent. Their songs are of war and peace, of drinking and people, of Ireland and the Irish. On and off stage they are barbs and gentlemen, actors and singers. They are immensely talented individuals, and an immensely talented group. They are the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem. On Saturday evening a dinner in honor of the delegates was held in the VIP Room at the Canadian Legion.

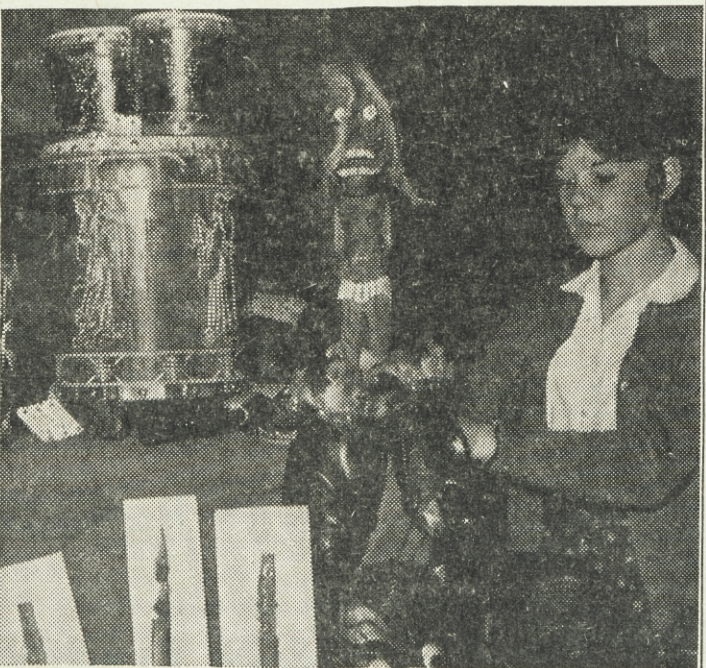
