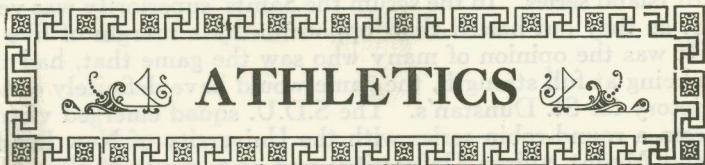

As collegiate activities swung into action this fall another banner year in intercollegiate sport was predicted for St. Dunstan's. Many of last year's athletes have returned to their studies here and other prospects have come to join them. Some of last year's junior players are also ready to move up into senior competition and some indeed have already established themselves in the faster circuit. The Saints this year are once again entered in Maritime Senior



Intercollegiate football and hockey. And although it has not yet been definitely decided upon, it seems likely that the Red and White basketball team will enter the junior varsity basketball circuit.

The coaching this year is under practically the same capable supervision as last year. A. J. MacAdam is in charge of our first football team and is also coach of the second rugby squad.

Rev. George A. MacDonald is again coaching hockey, and Rev. Walter McGuigan is handling basketball and is also the faculty supervisor of athletics. Intramural football is being supervised by Rev. R. G. Ellsworth, and Eugene MacDonald.

St. Dunstan's was represented at the annual M. I. A. U. meeting on October 7, at Truro by Rev. Walter McGuigan and Elmer Murnaghan, President of the St. Dunstan's A.A.A. At this point the **Red and White** wishes to congratulate the St. Dunstan's A.A.A. executive, especially President Elmer Murnaghan and Secretary Charlie Kelly, for the capable manner in which they have handled athletics so far this year.

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### FOOTBALL

The Saints senior squad has just completed their schedule for this year. In a sudden death encounter for the Maritime Intercollegiate rugby title with St. Francis Xavier University from Antigonish, Nova Scotia, the Saints dropped a close decision 5-3. The Saints were not beaten by a better team in our opinion and could easily have emerged the winner. The driving rain in which the game was played was a great disadvantage to the fast-breaking S. D. U. backfield; and the **Red and White** squad was further weakened by injuries sustained in the New Brunswick—Prince Edward Island series. In the scrum the Saints' superiority was very evident as they out-heeled their opponents by a margin of five to one. It was the opinion of many who saw the game that, had the Saints being at full strength, the game would have definitely ended in a victory for St. Dunstan's. The S.D.U. squad emerged victorious from a round-robin series with the University of New Brunswick and Mount Allison University; and as a result of their two wins and a tie are the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Intercollegiate rugby champs. It was a hard won and costly series as it resulted in very serious injuries to three of our key men. Bob Noble, a valuable backfield man, suffered a broken collarbone; Jim Ayers, suffered a back injury; and Cart MacDonald, our highly rated fullback, is nursing a severely injured shoulder. The intercollegiate games here this year have been witnessed by over-



flowing crowds and many of the fans have put themselves on record by saying that they saw some of the finest football of their lives. In their two games with U.N.B. the Red and White boys tied at Fredericton 3-3, and won very decisively here at St. Dunstan's 13-0 in what was beyond a doubt the nicest display of football put on here for years by any team. The Saints in their series with Mount Allison got away to a bad start as they dropped the first game at Sackville 11-0, but they downed the Mounties in their return game 6-3.

The Charlottetown Abbies entered Island Senior rugby competition this year and the Saints have up to date handed them two rather decisive setbacks 13-0 and 18-3, the latter game being a play-off game. However it is doubtful whether this series will be completed due to the lateness of the football season.

The second St. Dunstan's Football team has up to date played four games with Prince of Wales College. The Red and White squad has won two games and tied one, while P. W. C. has won one and tied one. However, one St. Dunstan's win was scored in an exhibition encounter and at present the two teams are tied with a win and a draw in the best out of three series.

The third St. Dunstan's rugby team has up to date a perfect record, having yet to be scored upon this season. They have defeated the second Prince of Wales team twice by scores of 6-0 and 9-0. This speaks well for the calibre of football in the intramural league from which the third team is chosen. We would go so far as to say that the team is nearly on a par with second team, a fact proven by the hard-fought contests played between these two teams. Some attribute this success to the latest phenomenon of football, "The Kelly Shift", originated by and still kept a close secret by "Chuck" Kelly, a bruising forward from the intramural ranks.

In the senior events Johnny Cash repeated his sweeping victory of last year and walked off with top honors in that department, as he narrowly missed breaking several records on a slow, damp track.

While the spotlight was being held in the senior events by Cash, seventeen-year old Bob Jay swept aside all opposition in the junior events as he captured seven firsts to lead by a wide margin, Jay seems to have great athletic potentialities and with the proper coaching and training, should develop into an outstanding athlete. Two beautiful trophies were donated for this meet; one to the senior all-round athlete by Tip Top Tailors, and another for the junior all-round by Kelly and MacInnis.

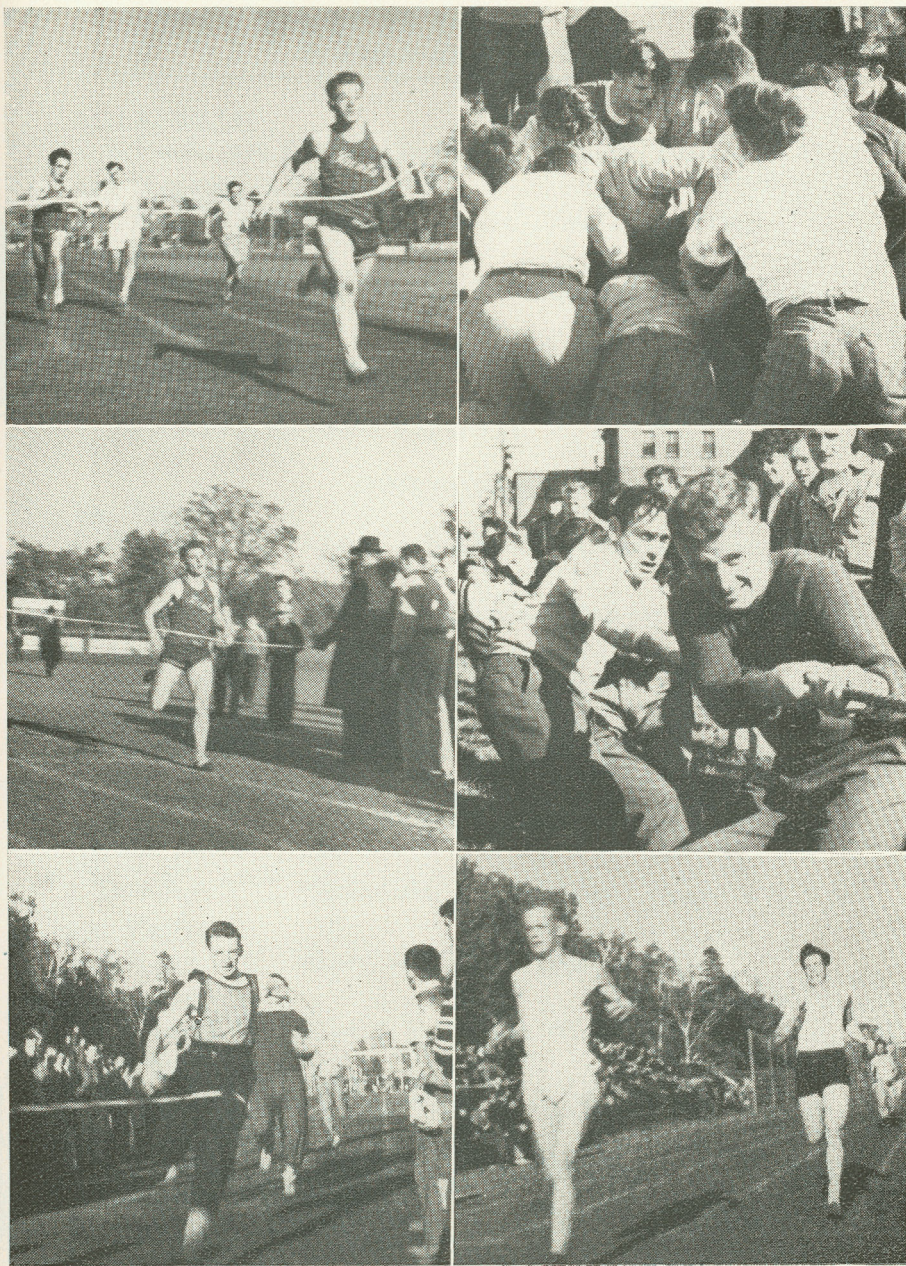

Third Saints have two exhibition victories to their credit so far this year, both over P. W. C. by scores of 6-0 and 9-0. The scoring punch of the Red and White team in the latter encounter was their "pint-sized" picking quarter, "Fido" McCarville. About all we can learn about this "Kelley Shift" is that Fido is an important factor in it. Among the other players who showed up well in these games were Stanley Deighan, Bob Jay, and Joe Mallette, all backfield men.

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**MARITIME INTERCOLLEGIATE GAMES**

On Saturday, October 16, the Saints opened their Maritime intercollegiate schedule at Mount Allison by suffering a severe reversal. The Mounties set down the Saints by a score of 11-0. The S.D.U. squad started towards the road to victory on October 27 at Fredericton as they held the U. N. B. rugby team to a 3-all draw. The Saints grabbed the lead on a try by "Bun" Callaghan only to have Kelleher of U.N.B. tie it up by crossing the Saints' line. In this game Bob Noble, valuable S.D.U. back-field man suffered a broken collarbone.

On Wednesday, November 3, MacAdam's boys really put on a show as they played some of the finest football seen here in years, to down U.N.B. 13-0. They ran wild over the Fredericton boys and left no doubt as to their superiority over the squad; there were no individual stars in the game, just thirteen football players out there doing everything the right way at the right time. The Saints' tries were scored by Hennessey, MacIsaac, and Ayers. And Cart was successful in converting one for the extra points.

On Saturday, November 6, an estimated 1500 fans saw a football game with a finish that they well may never see again. Described as the most exciting finish in Maritime Intercollegiate football by a leading Maritime sports announcer, the game clinched for the Saints the New Brunswick—Prince Edward Island rugby supremacy. Joe Mahar of the Red and White boys scored the first try of the game and Goodall of the Mounties evened the count shortly after the second half started. The two teams continued to battle down to the last minutes of the game which seemed destined to end in a 3-all tie. Then Coach MacAdam injected his speed artist, Johnny Cash, into the game to replace his injured fullback Cart MacDonald with just a few minutes to go. Cash made two brilliant runs; on the first one he carried the ball deep into Mt. A. territory, and the second time he crossed the Mounties' goal line with a piece of broken field running that still has them talking. Yes, that boy can travel.

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### TRURO GAME

In their final game of the season the Senior Saints dropped a hard-fought game to St. Francis Xavier University of Antigonish as they finished on the short end of a 5-3 score. The game was played in a driving rainstorm which hindered greatly the effectiveness of the S.D.U. backfield even though the Saints' scrum showed a vast superiority over their opponents in heeling the ball. Had the S.D.U. boys been at full strength and had the game been played on a dry day, we feel the outcome would have been a very



favorable one for the Saints. The score for the St. Dunstan's team was made by Reg Rodgers from a scrum near the St. F.X. goal line. The Xaverians' points were accounted for by a try by Dunc MacIntyre which was converted. The Saints missed their convert from a difficult angle, and also missed several penalty kicks which they would have easily turned into points had the rain not rendered the ball so heavy and slippery.

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### ISLAND SENIOR RUGBY GAME

The Red and White boys chalked up an easy 18-3 win over the Charlottetown Abbies in the first game for the Island Senior Football title. There seems no doubt the Abbies are no match for the fast and hard hitting Senior squad. However, the Charlottetown players seemed to be suffering from lack of condition. The scoring for the Abbies was done by Douglas, who was the only Abbie to cross the S.D.U. line. McPhee for the Saints scored twice and Henessey and Ayers each scored once. Cart successfully converted two of the tries, while "Big Willie", the popular Captain of the Red and White boys and one of the best forwards in the game, converted another one.

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### ISLAND INTERMEDIATE INTERCOLLEGIATE GAMES

On Thursday, November 4, in the first game of the best out of three series, the Second Saints and Prince of Wales battled to a scoreless tie in a slow and evenly matched game. The only player of the Saints who looked impressive was Dunstan Murphy, a fast backfield man.
