

The college was the scene of what might have been a most destructive fire which broke out about nine o'clock on the night of December 8th. Discovering the fire in the dormitory trunk room, "Big" Frank Aylward, Custodian of the dormitory, gave the alarm. The students quickly formed bucket brigades and, putting the stirrup pumps and hand extinguishers into action, they fought the blaze until the arrival of the city firemen. As the blaze was confined between the ceiling and the roof, the students had some difficulty in reaching it since they lacked proper cutting equipment. Fire Chief Angus MacEachern paid tribute to the students efforts saying, "They did a good job in holding the fire in check until we arrived." Before being brought under control the threatening blaze spread over about half of the new "dorm" and considerable damage was caused by fire and water to the extent of approximately \$5,000. As a safety precaution the older students kept fire watches for the remainder of the night.

The Rector thanked the students for the prompt and effective manner with which they dealt with the situation and the willingness that each student showed by his pitching in and doing his part.

University work was not interrupted nor did the students suffer any appreciable loss by the fire. For the remaining two weeks of the term the dormitory students were housed in the two large classrooms on the third floor of the old building, and in several vacant rooms. When college reopened in the new year the students were able to reoccupy their usual sleeping quarters.

Father Simpson gave a comprehensive report of the first Canadian National Mission Exhibition which was held in Toronto from Oct. 16th. to the 19th. During the course of his address the Reverend speaker, who was the diocesan representative, described the setting of the Exhibition which showed the oneness of the Church. He also gave a summary of the speech of Bishop O'Gara who told of his experiences as a prisoner of the Japanese. A vote of thanks was tendered Father Simpson by Allan MacDonald, President of our unit of the C. C. S. M. C.

## THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

Under the direction of Rev. M. E. Francis, the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University has already given extension courses to fishermen and farmers at South Rustico, Morell, O'Leary and Georgetown. All the courses were well attended and after each course committees were appointed to organize study clubs and also to continue the work begun by the course. The Extension Department of St. Dunstan's was assisted by Prof. A. B. MacDonald and Mrs. J. H. Delaney of St. Francis Xavier Extension Department, by the Dominion Department of Fisheries and by the Provincial and Federal Departments of Agricultue. It is expected that one or two more courses will be given this winter.

Outside of the courses, the work of organizing study clubs has been going on almost continuously; meetings have been held in about a score of localities throughout the Province. By spring it is expected that the following places will organize Credit Unions: Lot 11, O'Leary, Kelly's Cross, Lot 65, Edon and probably several other places.

Among the four Islanders who were awarded Efficiency or Good Conduct decorations was Major J. Frank MacMillan of the class of 1925. Major MacMillan is education officer at M. D. No. 6 Halifax.

Joseph "Dody" Martin, ex '43, has enlisted in the army and is at present taking a course at Camp Borden.

On Feby 11th, a skating party was held in the College rink when the students were hosts to about fifty young ladies from the city. Andrew MacDonald, one of this year's Seniors was in charge of all details and to him goes much credit for the success of the party. Music for the skate was supplied by the sound system which was installed last year.

This was the first time in twenty-six years that the rink was open to others outside the student body.

Some autumn copies of the "Norfolk Medical News" published by the Medical Society of Norfolk District of Massachusetts were recently perused. We notice that Dr. J. C. V.
