St. Thomas Literary And Debating Society

The first meeting of the St. Thomas Literary and Debating Society, for the school-year 1909-10, was held Wednesday evening, Dec. 1st. James A. Murphy was appointed Chairman pro tem, and the following officers were elected for the coming year:

Moderator—Rev. A. B. MacDonald, D. D.

President—Joseph W. McDonald.

Vice-Pres—James A. Murphy.

Sec.-Treas—Hugh Cavanagh.

Executive Committee—William Bowlen, Jos. C. McDonald and Joseph McKenzie.

It was resolved that this year's proceedings take the form of a Mock Parliament, and the following committee was appointed to apportion the members, and assign constituencies. Henry Blanchard, Willard McNeill, George Trainor, John F. McDonald, Gerald McCarthy.

The executive committee was authorized to revise the constitution and bye-laws, and the meeting was then adjourned.

The second meeting was held Wednesday December 8th at 2 p. m., and was called to order by President McDonald.

The constitution and by-laws, as revised, were read by Mr. Bowlen, and were adopted after a few amendments had been made. The report of the committee appointed to apportion members and assign constituencies was read by Mr. Blanchard, and adopted. The names of the members of the Mock Parliament, and their constituencies were read, and the committee commended for its good work in making an equal division. Hon. W. W. Hughes, member from Bonaventure was chosen Speaker and it was decided that the parties be called the Government and Opposition parties.

The following committee of three was appointed to arrange

for lectures during the coming year. Wade Hughes, Owen Kiggins and Henry Blanchard.

The parties were ordered to select their leaders before Sunday, December 12th, and the meeting was adjourned.

The society held a short meeting Sunday, December 12th, to complete arrangements for the forming of Parliament. The names of the leaders of the parties were announced. They are Hon. Jos. W. McDonald, Calgary, Premier, Hon. James A. Murphy, St. John, leader of the Opposition. The meeting was adjourned till January 19th, 1910, when Parliament will be opened.

It is expected that there will be some very interesting debates during the coming session of Parliament, for both parties possess members who are already well known for their oratorical qualities. There are also a few new comers, who are reported to be very eloquent, and with a little experience, they may make things interesting for some of the older members. Considerable interest is being shown in the proceedings this year, by all the members of the society.
