

### Our Graduates.

William V. MacDonald, Alban Reid and J. Emmet Dougan are pursuing their theological studies at the Grand Seminary, Quebec; Mr. Francis Walker at Holy Heart, Halifax, and Mr. Edward P. Curley, St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore. All of these are men, whose worth of character and honest fidelity to work, coupled with the strict moral principles which always characterized their college life, eminently fit them for the performance of the sacred duties, which they will be called upon to fulfill in their chosen walk of life.

The three French Canadians of the class, Messrs. Jules Drouin, Arthur Jobin and Henri Robillard have all taken up the study of law in Laval University, the first two at Quebec and the last named at

Montreal.

# Bishop Morrison's Address.

On Tuesday, September 23rd, we had the pleasure of a visit from His Lordship Dr. Morrison, Bishop of Antigonish, a former Rector of our college. The students received him in the study-hall where

they listened to a short, yet interesting and instructive address from His Lordship. Bishop Morrison expressed his great pleasure in meeting the students of St. Dunstan's—the institution at which he himself received his early education. He spoke of the days when he was studying here and of the very superior advantages which boys of the present days have. He reminded the students that now, while at college they were laying the foundation for the super-structure of manhood and esrnestly impressed upon them the necessity of employing their time to the very best advantage. He spoke of the great openings in every profession and walk of life for good, moral upright men. Above all he exhorted each and every one to be strictly honest in all his dealings with his fellow-students and to practise while at college those sound principles of morality and good conduct which would last all through life.

# Episcopal Visit.

On Monday, October 27th, we were honored by a second Episcopal visit, this time from our own Bishop, His Lordship Dr. O'Leary. He was accompanied by another eminent churchman, Rev. F. C. Kelly, D. D. LL. D., President of the American Church Extension Society, Chicago. After dinner, both His Lordship and Dr. Kelly gave short addresses. in the College Dining Hall, which were much appreciated by the students. After expressing the great pleasure which he felt at meeting so many students attending the Catholic College of his diocese, His Lordship spoke of the fame which St. Dunstan's had long since gained for herself and of the many great men she had sent forth to take eminent positions in every walk of life. He hoped that the present-day students would follow the example of the Alumni and keep up the glorious record of the college by taking advantage of all the many opportunities offered them at St. Dunstan's, for their mental and moral development. After granting a holiday, the Bishop then introduced Dr. Kelly as "One of St. Dunstan's most

distinguished sons." Father Kelly's address was very interesting and entertaining. He first of all spoke of the kindly feeling which he had always felt towards his Alma Mater and of the pleasure which he always derived from revisiting the scenes of his boyhood and in his own peculiarly fascinating way, told many amusing stories of incidents which took place in St. Dunstan's in the older days.

The opening of the House took place on Thursday, December 11th, and was accompanied by the usual pompous ceremonies and brilliant pegeantry, customary on such occasions. The speech from the throne which was read by His Excellency Rev. P. F. Hughes, covered a wide range of subjects including among other important questions the construction of a Canadian Navy, an increase in the British Preference, and a Redistribution bill.

Mr. McDougall, are men well-fitted to shape the destinies of a nation and their political and oratorical abilities are already well-known to the public. In the ranks of their supporters may be found some of the older members who have already done eminent service for their country, and won the laurels of Parliamentary debate. The new members, moreover, show great enthusiasm and altogether, a very interesting and successful year is looked forward to by the Society.
