HOCKEY

Last year, due to the shortage of first-line players S. As we go to press the Saints are giving every indication that they are a team to be reckoned with when play-off time rolls around.

The Team

F. MacKinnon (Shorty) has proven himself one of the ablest net-minders the Saints ever had. Before joining the Canadian Army, he played with the Charlottetown Canadians. His first year with the Saints, he is turning in a brilliant performance.

J. MacAdam — A tower of strength, A. J. has played on their defense for the past three seasons; he has lost none of his outstanding ability and still features a hard shot and a very effective poke-check.

M. Hennessey (Capt.)—"Mike" plays the rear-guard, and has shown himself a fast and aggressive player when the occasion demands as well as a rugged defenseman.

E. Cameron—The only player at S.D.U. to come up through the ranks, he is a fast and aggressive skater who can fill the right wing position or the rear-guard equally well.

C. MacDonald—Star pivot of the first line, Cart is a new member of the team. He was recently discharged from the Navy and entered S.D.U. last fall.

J. Mahar—Another ex-serviceman, Joe combines speed with playing ability. He usually figures in the majority of S.D.U. goals.

A. MacIsaac—Fast right-winger of the first line, "Kiker" has accounted for many of their goals so far this season.

R. Rodgers—A new member of the team, Reg played hockey for Borden before spending three years in the R. C.A.F. at home and abroad. The center of the second line, he is a fast and smooth player.

W. Ledwell—A graduate from Intramural ranks, Billy has already proven himself an asset on the right wing of the second line.

J. Thibeault—Another newcomer, he plays left wing, completing the second line, which has accounted for its share of scores so far this season.

J. MacQuaid—Veteran back from Overseas, Jerry played with the Saints in former years, before donning the khaki of the Canadian Army. He centers the third line.

R. Dorsey—Recently discharged from the navy, Ralph plays right wing. He is a determined player and is particularly dangerous around the net.

B. MacDougall—"Porky" played with the Collegians last year and this year he is again patrolling the left lane.

In their first game in the Charlottetown Hockey League this season, the fast-skating, aggressive S.D.U. squad defeated the rugged Legionnaires by a score of 4-2 in an encounter that featured fast-skating, close-checking, and brilliant goal-tending. The Saints had to battle all the way to offset the determined attacks of the veterans.

The Saints took the lead about the half-way mark of the first period when Joe Mahar picked up the puck at center, crossed the blueline, and passed to Cart MacDonald, who gave Cudmore no chance on the shot. The Legionnaires attacked incessantly for the remainder of the period, but the smooth working S. D. U. defense, and the brilliant net-minding of "Shorty" MacKinnon held them at bay.

Three minutes after the opening bell of the second canto, Shepherd picked up Dowling's pass from behind the net to slam the puck home, knotting the count. For the next thirteen minutes, both teams played fast scoreless hockey, first one team having the advantage then the other. Both goalies came through with some hair-raising saves. The Saints' efforts were finally rewarded as Dorsey, skating in fast, centered from behind the net to MacQuaid who lost no time in slipping the disc into the cage. For the remainder of the period the Saints hemmed their opponents inside the blueline, but were unable to beat Cudmore again.

Early in the third session MacLaughlin and Mahar were sent to the cooler within seconds of each other, leaving both teams short-handed. The Legionnaires, using four forwards in an effort to tie it up, had the better of the play, but it was impossible to beat MacKinnon. As the teams came to full strength, the Saints took the offensive and accounted for their third goal when Ledwell whisked Thibault's pass behind Cudmore. Three minutes later Perry of the Veterans wound up behind his own net, skated the length of the ice, and gave MacKinnon no chance on a close-in shot. From then on the Legion squad fought furiously to even the score; but the tight S.D.U. defense and the star performance of MacKinnon between the posts repulsed all attacks. Finally with but 25 seconds left in the game, MacIsaac, combining with Mahar and MacDonald, dented the twines behind Cudmore to put the game on the ice for the Saints.

Starring honors went to both goalies who made some sensational saves from close range. No less sensational was the performance of J. MacAdam, veteran S.D.U. defenseman, whose superb work on the rear-guard was a deciding factor in the game.

The game got off to a slow start as the Navy hemmed the Saints in behind the blueline, but the Saints recovered as MacAdam passed to Thibault whose relay sent Rodgers into the clear and he back-handed a beautiful shot that caught the upper right hand corner of the net. Half-way through the session Cart MacDonald picked up the disc at centre, and skating in fast, he whipped a pass to MacIsaac whose angle shot had Davis beaten all the way. The Navy made it 2-1 a minute later when Cudmore, taking MacLeod's pass, back-handed the puck behind MacKinnon. Late in the period Cart MacDonald put the Saints two up when his long shot from the blueline dented the twines behind the surprised Davis.

The Navy came out full of fight in the middle canto, and were awarded 44 seconds later, when Higson's pass to Junop put him in the clear, and the latter beat MacKinnon cleanly. The Navy, now on the offensive, surged in on the Saints. "Shorty" MacKinnon was unbeatable as he pulled off some phenomenal saves from close range. Well past the halfway mark, Higson skated the length of the ice, and blasted a short drive behind MacKinnon knotting the count at 3-all. Four minutes later Rodgers snared the loose puck in the Navy zone and his long drive found the unprotected side of the Navy net to put the Saints in the lead again.

A minute and a half after the last period got under way, MacIsaac got his second goal of the game as he lifted the puck over the prostrate Davis to make the score 5-3. Cart MacDonald drew an assist on the play. The sailors got it back however a minute later when Junop scored on a pass from Cudmore. Play was fast and furious for the rest of the game but the score remained 5-4. A penalty to Thibault gave the Navy the advantage but it was the

Held scoreless in the first two periods, the Saints opened fast in the third, and for the first three minutes it looked like they were back in the running, but P.W.C. rallied and added another score as Nicolle got his second goal of the game. The best scoring chance that the Saints had came when Cart MacDonald on a passing play with Joe Mahar, had Proude at his mercy but missed the open net. With less than five minutes left in the game Beer ended the scoring when he accepted a pass from Bagnall outside the goal crease to make it 7-0.

It was a fast skating, rugged game throughout; eight penalties were handed out, four to each team. Although beaten seven times, MacKinnon put on his usual spectacular
