IN MEMORIAM

REV. MARTIN F. MONAGHAN

The untimely passing of Rev. Martin Monaghan, parish priest of Amherst, M. I., was a shock to his relatives and many friends. Following a particularly strenuous winter Father Monaghan was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital early in January, but in spite of the best medical care could not make a recovery from his illness, and passed away on April 19th. Born at Kelly's Cross in 1899, he received his early education at Saint Joseph's Convent and Queen Square School, later continuing his studies at Prince of Wales and Saint Dunstan's where he graduated with the class of '21. He studied theology at the Grand Seminary, Quebec, and in 1925 was elevated to the Holy Priesthood by the late Bishop O'Leary of Charlottetown. For two years following his ordination he served as curate at Souris, after which he received his appointment to Amherst where he served until his death.

Coming from a family which has given five other sons to the Priesthood, we would expect that Father Martin possessed outstanding qualities in that high calling. These expectations are justified in every respect. He was the ideal type of priest, who exemplified our Lord's description of the good shepherd who knew and loved his sheep. That great love was manifested by his constant devotion to his flock in this life and his desire to be with them even in death. He was buried among his former parishioners, where he will be gradually joined by those who now deeply mourn him and for whom he lived and died.

JOSEPH E. GILLIS, K.C.

A newspaper report from the western provinces informed us recently of the death at Blairmore, Alta., of Joseph E. Gillis. Mr. Gillis was a native of Miscouche and attended St. Dunstan's, graduating with the class of 1908. After graduation he remained here as a professor till 1912, during which time he studied law in the Charlottetown office of the present Chief Justice, the Honorable J. A. Mathieson. He then went to the prairie provinces where he obtained considerable prominence with the result that he was chosen standard-bearer of the Liberal party

in the election of 1921. We do not know any of the details of his life but from his candidacy and his elevation to the rank of King's Counsel we judge that he had acquired a good reputation as a lawyer and citizen. Old class-mates will remember his oratorical powers and active intellect, and his former pupils, while he was vice-principal at Queen Square and a teacher here, will regret the passing of a splendid instructor and outstanding gentleman. MAYOR LUCIEN BOURASSA

Students of twenty years ago will regret to hear of the demise at the early age of fifty-two of Mayor Lucien Bourassa, Shawinigan Falls. Mr. Bourassa was a student here from 1904-06 and was an outstanding and popular athlete at that time. A rugged and powerful football and hockey player, besides playing on the College teams he played cover point on the old Victoria hockey team in Charlottetown. After leaving St. Dunstan's he advanced steadily to a position of prominence in the business and social life of his city which culminated in his election to the mayoralty last July. Unfortunately, ill-health overcame him and he passed away on the first of April after a short term of office. As he was a loyal citizen of Shawinigan and a generous friend of the poor, his civic funeral held a few days later drew a large number of mourners. Qu'il repose en paix.

MICHAEL J. MOREN

We regret to chronicle the sudden passing of Mr. Michael J. Moren, an elder Alumnus well-known in Charlottetown and throughout the diocese. Born at Newport he attended St. Dunstan's and from here entered the employ of Peake Bros. After a decade with this wholesale firm he entered the Customs service in Charlottetown advancing to the position of Chief Clerk before his retirement in 1924. Since that time he has been accountant for the Diocese of Charlottetown, which position he filled capably and carefully up to the day of his death.
