

Students Appointed To Senate Committees

To the best of our knowledge, students are represented on Senate Committees for the first time in the history of S.D.U.

On October 18, 1967, the Senate approved the '67-'68 line up of committees.

Members of the Students Activities Committees are: Faculty Advisor to Students' Union (chairman), Dean of Arts and Science, Dean of Men, Dean of Women, Spiritual Director, Student Counsellor, President of the Students' Union, and a student (Mary Jane Connick).

Responsibilities of this committee include the correlation of student activities to insure that harmony exists between various activities.

The Athletic Council includes: Faculty adviser on athletics (chairman), J. J. Coyle, Athletic director, hockey coach, J. J. Revell, Mrs. B. Conley, SDUSU president, and the president of the Athletic association.

The council determines university policy concerning intercollegiate and off campus competition and advises and assists the athletic director in improving the varsity and intermural athletic programs.

Members of the Student-Faculty committee are: Faculty adviser to the Student's Union (chairman), the Bursar, the Student Counsellor, and two students (Tom Green and Sister Alice Callaghan).

The committee will act as a liaison between students, faculty, and administration. Matter of mutual interest and concern will be dealt with by this committee.

The Convocation Committee includes the President (chairman), the Dean of Arts and Science, the Registrar, and two members of the senior class.

The Senate Agenda Committee has D. J. O'Connell (chairman), Dr. B. O'Grady, and Rev. V. G. Murnaghan.

Students are requested to bring to the attention of the chairman matters which they wish brought before the Senate.

Through the eyes of this reporter the appointment of members of the student body to these committees is a step in the right direction. The students on these committees do have a vote with the exception of the Athletic Council. Therefore students now have at least an indirect voice in the Senate.

These student committee members are competent people, and it is felt that their presence will be beneficial to the committees.

When asked his opinion as to the views of the Senate regarding student committees, Father Kelly, Senate secretary, stated that in part that "the Senate as a body are on record as approving the arrangement. To my knowledge, there were no dissenters and several felt that it was long overdue."

When asked what affect the presence of students on committees may have on the senate, he stated in part, "I think it is quite possible there could be some notable results from this arrangement, but I want to emphasize very strongly the reason for my expectation. The reason is not because of a lack of interest for student welfare or student interests on the part of the Senate, but because many apparent conflicts and real frustrations of the past due to sheer lack of communication will now be eliminated and the two segments of the university which really desire the same goals will now encourage and reinforce one another simply through good communication."

This reporter feels that although these developments are an improvement on the previous, more progress is desirable. Perhaps these developments will start the wheels of progress rolling and help us to move into the twentieth century.

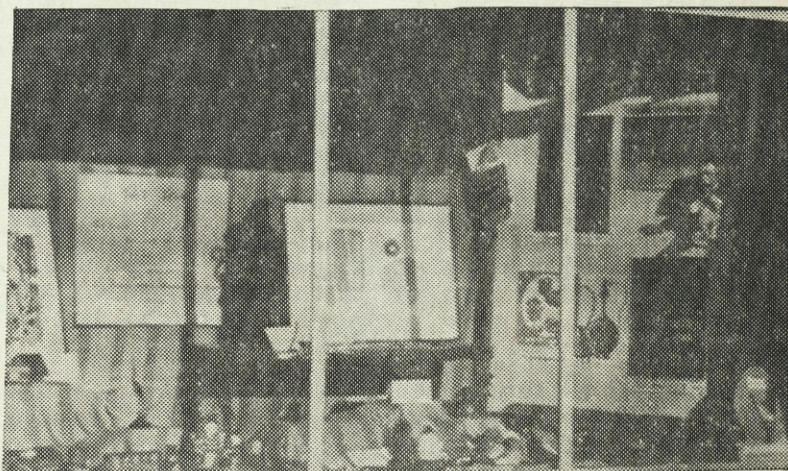
TREASURE VAN HERE
