THE MAKING OF A CAMPUS PAPER

ALL OF YOU ARE by now familiar with the name of our student publication -RED AND WHITE. Though your interests may not lie along journalistic lines, you will at least be passively concerned with the production of RED AND WHITE during your years at St. Dunstan's. It serves to present a variety of student opinion on matters of current importance and to report newsworthy items of campus interest. In so doing it hopes to provide a forum where all may join to consider the views of others and, moreover, to express their personal setiments.

IN THE PAST, RED AND WHITE was published on a bimonthly basis—seven issues from September to May. This year, for the first time, RED AND WHITE will appear on a monthly basis with twice the number of editions.

AT THE CENTRE OF operations stands a staff of interested students who coordinate its activity. Features, sports, news, advertising, business, layout and circulation, for example, require specialized individual attention. At the head of each group is a department editor who is responsible for the management of his particular branch. Several assistants are assigned to each department; it is their duty to aid the editor and to prepare themselves for an eventual promotion. To centralize the entire sphere of production are the Associate Editor and the Editor-in-Chief.

THOUGH THE STAFF IS necessary to compile and coordinate material, RED AND WHITE exists primarily to afford the student body a medium of expression. Without student contributions, the entire purpose and effect of RED AND WHITE is necessarily impaired. Several columns are reserved for articles submitted from outside that immediate staff. It is presumed that through these columns interest in current events will be stimulated. All are urged to make use of this space.

A NUMBER OF STAFF POSITIONS were vacated by last years graduating class, and consequently, the incoming Freshmen Class will be called upon to fill these empty posts. Of course, all with literary ability can be an asset to our campus newspaper, but the RED AND WHITE staff is not comprised of writers alone. At present, openings exist not only for staff writers, but for assistants in the circulation, advertising and layout departments. All interested in any of the above mentioned positions are urged to attend the RED AND WHITE organization meeting, to be held early next week. The exact time and place of this meeting will be posted on all bulletin boards.

The call to become one of God's ministers has gone out to many. Some who hear it, like the rich man of the Gospel story, turn away sad and do not answer. Others, heeding the call, give up the attract ions of the world to dedicate themselves in a special way to God's service. One of these latter was born in this parish fifty-seven years ago. Father Fred Cass, the second youngest of a family of eleven children grew up on one of the finest farms in Queens County, a farm that was made so by the efforts of the sons and daughters, who with pride, laboured mightily under the watchful eye of the perfectionist, their father. As a young lad, Father Fred attended East Wilt shire school where he learned the rudiments of the three R's and where, according to himself, he acquired considerable experience in the art of self defence. He continued through P. W. C., to teaching to Saint Dunstan's to his graduation in 1931, when the seeds of Vocation fostered by his pious father and mother grew and flowered. Four strenuous years in the seminary at Quebec and Father Cass received the Unction of the priesthood in this same sanctuary where he lies today. Submissive to the will of his superiors, Father Cass put in four more strenuous years in the study of Chemistry to obtain his degree with honours at McGill and to come back to St. Dunstan's to take over the Department of Chemistry. For twenty-five active teaching years Father Cass devoted his great talents for imparting knowledge, sometimes to not too receptive minds. His marvellous command of the English language and his facility of expression, not only verbal but facial and manual, made his lectures something to remember even by the slow-witted. He did not confine his activities to the classroom, tour sellor, moderator and coach, he gave to whatever he under took an inspiration and a leadership that brought forth from the stadents themselves a response that very often astonished everyone. interest in athletics was well known and many a young student has cause to be grateful for advice and assistance that Father Cass so freely gave.

The school year was not long enough for his boundless energy and summer vacations were devoted to pastoral work in parishes of later in the Chaplain's service with the Army, and it was a sad day for him when he was not able to continue an austere program of sum-
