

Saints Win First Three Starts To Lead B-Division of A.F.C.

Saint Dunstan's Varsity, playing stalwart ball under the capable coaching of Ed Hilton, posted three wins in as many starts to take sole possession of first place in the B-division of the Atlantic Football Conference, by beating Shearwater 18-14 in the first contest, Acadia 19-6 in the second, and then by swamping Dalhousie 77-0 in the third. The Saints came from behind at the 9:52 mark of the last quarter in the first game, took the lead and held on to it in the second, and easily coasted to victory in the third.

S.D.U. 18 SHEAR. 14

The Saints struck early for the opening score with Gord Dooley setting it up with a pass interception on the Shearwater 25. After Bentham had picked up first down yardage on two plunges good for 15, Driscoll turned the right end and barged into the end zone. The score remained 6-0 until late in the second quarter when a penalty to the Saints moved the ball to the S.D.U. 30, and seconds before the half ended, Blanchard crashed off tackle for the TD. Concordia converted and the score was 7-6 for the Furies.

In the second half, one minute had passed when the Furies struck for another TD. With Murray Duaz turning right end after a double reverse in the backfield, Warner sprung him loose with a block on Todd and the backfielder galloped 70 yds. to pay dirt.

The Saints struck right back. From their own 30, they began an eighty yard march with Ben-

tham, Ellis, and Gillis hammering their way up the middle and around the ends for yardage and it was Bentham who put the finishing touches on the drive with a 9-yard smash off tackle for the major.

Gerry Gillis began the Saint march for the winner when he intercepted a pass on his own 40. A beautiful 45 yard pass and run play from Hopper to DesRoches moved the ball to the Furies' 25 and three plays later, Driscoll smashed his way over the line for his second and winning touchdown.

S.D.U. 19, ACADIA 6

After a scoreless first quarter, S.D.U. set up its first TD on a fake field goal with Driscoll passing to Todd on the 5 yard line. On the next play, Driscoll banged off tackle for the score which was converted by Rene Perry. With five mins. remaining in the quarter, John Hughes was Johnnie on the Spot picking up an Acadia fumble. After a series of plays, Driscoll scored his second TD. of the afternoon, putting S.D.U. in front 12-0.

Len Ellis provided S.D.U. with the third tally of the day when he took a Hopper hand-off into pay dirt. Acadia scored its lone major in the fourth by recovering an S.D.U. fumble in the end zone.

Rene Perry who was performing well both ways was lost for the season via a knee injury. Jim Garrity and Don DesRoches played well in the front wall both ways and Dan Driscoll stood out in the backfield along

TIGER MEETS MASTER

In their game, the Saints ripped the Dalhousie "junior tigers" wide open, and after only 7 minutes of play, the score stood at a great 24-0. Ray MacLean started things going by picking up a fumble and crossed the line for 6 points. As soon as S.D.U. regained possession, a brilliant 60 yard pass and run play with Todd carrying netted another TD. A hand off to Ellis from Hopper scored the third, while Gillis picked up the fourth. Driscoll made a fine end run for the extra point and scoring his second TD, Ellis brought the score to 31-0.

In the second quarter, Todd opened with an interception and a 30 yard return. Three plays later, Gillis, running off tackle, picked up his second TD of the day. Ellis converted on a pass from Hopper. Minutes later Todd again pounded out a 55 yd. pass and run play, and after Bentham got the first down, Dan Driscoll took over with a line plunge to bring the score to 44-0. Hopper converted with a quarterback keep. Nearing the end of the first half, Todd recovered his own kick, but moments later, Dalhousie recovered and threatened for the first time on a 55 yard pass and run play from Murray to Robertson.

Early in the third quarter, the Tigers kept the Saints boxed in, but the Saints stood the test and remained firm on their two yard line with Gillis recovering a Dal. fumble. Two plays later, Ellis ran 85 yards off tackle for his third touchdown of the day. Jim Bentham brought the score to 71-0 by the end of the quarter with a fifteen yard smash up the middle.

The Saints hit for their twelfth touchdown in the fourth quarter with Jim Bentham again making a sensational run off tackle for his third TD of the game. The Tigers growled once when they intercepted an attempted throw down by Hopper, but they were promptly put in their place by a fine tackle by Jim Garrity.

To the victor belongs the spoils and Saints deserve it. The line was tremendous, opening holes large enough to drive a tank through. The back field worked spontaneously with Jack Hopper calling the signals, with great success. All together it was a fine display of team effort under the competent leadership of a fine coach.

In the first meeting between the Saints and P.W.C., the Welshmen threw a big surprise in defeating the Red and White. Having dropped a 61-3 decision to Mt. Allison the week previous they presented a united front to the J.V., picking up their points in the second quarter and beating off the attack by the Saints in the late stages.

P.W.C.'s major came when Wynne kicked a punt from his own end zone which hit the upright. Alan MacLean pounced on the loose ball for the only TD of the afternoon. Scantlebury kicked the extra point as well as a beautiful field goal from 25 yards out to wind up the scoring. Each team collected eight first downs, but the defense of both teams waged the big battle.

At Mt. Allison, two quick TD's by the Mounties in the first quarter again seemed to have the Saints on the run. Double reverse plays were the spark plug for these, but when the Saint defence shifted into a 7-3-2 formation, the opposition seemed helpless. Before the half, the Saints had knotted the score at 12-12 and then roared ahead on three TD's and two converts in the second half, while the Mounties could salvage only one safety touch. After the first quarter, there were no serious threats to the Saints, as the defense rose time after time to stop the Mt. Allison offense before they could get started, giving up only five first downs in the last three quarters.

Bob Simmons, playing a standout game for the Saints, ground out many first downs by smashing up the middle, scored two TD's, passed to Vernon MacDonald for another, and threw two convert passes to Joe Murphy for two other points. MacDonald got another TD, and Brady got the fifth. Gerard Wynne stood out both in defense and offense and Peter Steele contributed greatly to the Saint defense.

After the Saints scored their first TD, they struck quickly for their second. When they recovered the ball at centre field, Pelrine passed to Tingley on the first play, Simmons passed to MacDonald for the counter.

Jim Pelrine went the complete distance for the Saints, and as well as doing a competent job in directing the proceedings, pounded out several great end runs. Dave O'Brien, playing good ball throughout, made the best return of a kick in the game late in the first quarter. One fact which kept the Saints from running the score ver higher was the persistent good punting by the Mounties.

The Saints played the game without the services of Pete DesRoches, who was injured on the first kick off of the game.

Simmons Sets New Shot Put Record As Field Day Staged

Bob Simmons, North River, broke the 15-year-old shotput record at Saint Dunstan's University track and field day October 4. Bob hurled the sphere 47 ft. 6 in. to better the mark of Paul Gagnon made in 1945.

Simmons, and Bob Marshall, a Newfoundland product, dominated the senior events, each meriting their athletic "D" in track and field. Simmons and Marshall had 25 and 26 points respectively, 8 and 9 over the required total.

Simmons was in a class by himself in the field sports, winning the high jump, shotput, standing broad, hop-step-and-jump, javelin, discus and football pass, while Marshall dominated the running events, taking firsts in the 100 yard, 220, 440, and the running broad jump. Mike Macdonald, Bob MacDonald, and Charlie Fitzgerald fought it out in junior division.
