

## Cornucopia of Russian Propaganda

A recent visitor to P. E. I. in a time when the feelings of the general public were least disposed to a show of that 'good old Island hospitality' was former Russian Delegate to the United Nations, Vladimir Molchenor.

For over half an hour, Mr. Molchenor gave a talk on the United Nations and Russian policy therein, which would have made the most solid citizen defect, had it not been so inconsistent with actual Russian tactics as to be preposterous. Though Mr. Molchenor covered quite a few topics in his speech, the following were the basis for a question period afterwards:

1. That Russia desires peaceful co-existence and has, for the past two years been awaiting a decision on their proposal for nuclear testing from the big powers to whom the Russians have already made several concessions.

2. That they wish to improve the machinery of the U. N.

3. That they want East and West Germany to be represented, as the separate states they are, in the United Nations. The audience was told not to interrupt the speech and that questions would be welcomed afterwards. With this assurance the audience sat back and awaited the killing. Unfortunately, they were the ones killed.

Whatever one may think of Communism or of Russians, objectively he would have to admit that Mr. Molchenor was rather intelligent and extremely well indoctrinated. If one person in the audience was as well versed, and as sure of what he believed in, as Mr. Molchenor was, perhaps democracy would be gaining ground today. As it was, Mr. Molchenor's job was extremely easy. He merely set up general explanations from which all questions were resolved. By using the ideal order to apply actuality Mr. Molchenor left such a gap between what the Russians said occurred and what in reality did occur that argument without calling the man an outright liar was impossible.

The Cuban question, in its en-

tirety, was shelved by the assertion that Russia had the right to sell whatever she pleased to whomsoever would buy — as did the United States, or any other nation. This reduced the Russia-Cuba relationship to economic friendliness, whereby proof that it was a puppet state was impossible. Russia was absolved from guilt in the nuclear sphere by the fact that she had not initiated the arms race, therefore why should she be the first to cease.

The Wall in Germany was justified by the fact that any government has the right to set off its frontiers, but that East Germans were free to leave the country whenever they went through the proper channels. Why they persist in doing it the hard way is a mystery. (Could German Leapfrog be a modernization of Russian Roulette? Or is the reason the same as that which explains why Russia has so many olympic runners — they use the border for the finish line.)

In this same vein, any people under Communist domination are free to withdraw from the Communist bloc if they so desire. (Of course, everyone knows that these people are so happy now they could never return to their old Bourgeois existence.) Mr. M. also asserted that Mr. K. wants only peaceful co-existence and friendliness with everyone. When asked if this was the reason that he made such friendly statements as "We'll bury you!", Mr. M. begged ignorance of the circumstances under which this was uttered. (Probably at the annual gravediggers convention, Comrades.)

Perhaps the highlight of the evening was Mr. M.'s assertion that Communism does not want to dominate the world, or to inflict its ideology on other people. Most reassuring of all was Mr. M.'s statement that Canada could be ruled by any government she chose. After this we all clapped and went home, reassured that Communism was not so bad after all.

Judges for the design contest are Frank Newfeld, Director of Art and Production, McClelland and Stewart, Limited; D.C. Milton, Layout Design instructor, Ryerson Institute of Technology; Stewart Goodings, President, National Federation of Canadian University Students.

"Designs may be in one, two or three colours," said Miss Lee, "but in considering designs of equal merit, preference will be given to posters which are economical to reproduce."

as the development of cooperative hostels, canteens, student centres and bookstores; aid to student anti-T.B. campaigns; help to refugee students; erection of new sanatoria and health centres; provision of medical supplies and equipment to existing student health services; supply of much-needed text-books, technical journals, and laboratory apparatus; emergency aid after disasters such as floods, earthquakes, and so on."

"WUSC is not a completely sovereign body. It must abide by the international statutes, as interpreted by the international WUS General Assembly. Moreover, as WUS has no members, its governing bodies cannot and do not claim to 'represent' anyone except themselves. It is therefore very rare for a WUS governing body to pass a motion approving or disapproving the policy of an external body, such as a government, unless the policy is closely linked with a specific WUS project."

"Cooperation between NFCUS and WUSC on the national level in Canada is very close. It is customary for the NFCUS President and Vice President for International Affairs to serve on the WUSC National Committee and play an active part in the development of policy."

"In recent years the two organizations have cooperated closely on projects such as the raising of funds for World Refugee Year, earthquake relief in Chile, Algerian refugees and aid to Bantu students in South Africa. They jointly played a major role in establishing Canadian University Service Overseas (CUSO). They are now working together, and with the Canadian Mental Health Association, to organize the first Canadian Student Mental Health

## COOPERATION BETWEEN NFCUS AND WUSC

A joint NFCUS-WUSC statement, prepared by Paul Becker, past NFCUS Vice President for International Affairs, and Douglas Mayer, General Secretary of World University Service of Canada, has been issued to remind students, and, in some cases, to reveal the relationship that exists between the above mentioned organizations on campus, be it actual or potential.

It is important to realize that NFCUS and WUSC are not competing organizations. NFCUS has affirmed its support for and co-operation with World University Service of Canada, and the policy of the Canadian student community in channelling all international aid and emergency relief through this medium.

### ORIGIN AND ROLE OF NFCUS

"The basic scope of the Federation (NFCUS) was expressed in the constitution which established NFCUS in December, 1926: 'To promote a better understanding, surpassing both geography and language, among all Canadian university students, and to promote greater cooperation and correlation among student government bodies, in order to watch over the progress of student interests and academic freedom and to serve the cause of peace by creating ties with national unions of students around the globe.'"

"The chief role of the Federation in Canada is to promote the material and intellectual interests of the nation's students, the fundamental principle being that, if Canada's interests are to be served best, the university must be made accessible to all, having

regard only to objective standards of ability, and irrespective of economic circumstances. A second role is to serve as a bond uniting student communities across the country, and to foster a true Canadian spirit and national consciousness despite — and within — geographic and cultural differences."

"Just as students' council represents the students who elected it, so does NFCUS represent the students' council which determine its policies. NFCUS is a sovereign body, responsible only to its own constituents. It is specifically designed to 'represent' the students' councils and, through them, the students of Canada, and to act as their spokesman on national and international issues which are of concern to students."

### ORIGIN AND ROLE OF WUSC

"World University Service was founded in Europe in 1920. At first it was known as European Student Relief. In 1926 the name was changed to International Student Service and in 1950, following a revision of its statutes, it adopted the name of World University Service. It now operates in more than 50 countries. Its basic aims are to promote international solidarity and mutual service between students and professors throughout the world, and to support projects — particularly those initiated by students and professors — which meet the basic needs of the university community."

"Each year, local committees of WUSC throughout the world raise tens of thousands of dollars in order to finance projects such

## National Teacher Examinations to be held on Feb. 16, '63

The National Teacher Examinations, prepared and administered annually by Educational Testing Service, will be given at more than 300 testing centres throughout the United States on Saturday, February 16, 1963.

At the one-day testing session a candidate may take the Common Examinations, which include tests in Professional Information, General Culture, English Expression, and

Nonverbal Reasoning, as well as one or two of the thirteen Optional Examinations designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter to be taught. The college which a candidate is attending, or the school system in which he is seeking employment, will advise him whether he should take the National Teacher Examinations and which of the Optional Examinations to select.

A Bulletin of Information, containing an application and describing registration procedures, may

be obtained from college officials, school superintendents, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey. Completed applications, accompanied by proper examination fees, will be accepted by Educational Testing Service from November 1, 1962, but in any case must be received at Educational Testing Service not later than January 18, 1963.

"Clearly, both organizations have a distinctive and complementary role to play on each campus. Local supporters of each are much more likely to overcome student ignorance of inter-campus and inter-national activities if they speak with a common voice wherever possible, and try to reinforce each other's activities."

"In particular, they should remember that WUSC is the agency recognized by NFCUS for enabling Canadian students to make financial contributions to help fellow students in acute need in other countries."

"World University Service and national unions of students have cooperated closely for many years on the international and national levels, to the advantage of all concerned."

"Close cooperation between local groups on the campus level can produce similar beneficial results."
