

# Saints Eliminated From I.S.H.L. Play-Offs

Playing against tremendous odds for a play-off birth, the Varsity Saints caused plenty of excitement before a 4-2 defeat at the hands of the Royals dashed any hopes the Saints had of participating in the finals. Even though the Saints played only eight games to the other teams twenty, it remained for the last tilts to tell the tale. Cape Traverse Evinrudes were only two points ahead for the final play-off position as both teams took to the ice for their final tussles of the season. However, both lost, and Evinrudes held on to their fourth position.

The Saints, who picked up momentum as the season progressed, kept their hopes alive when in their sixth league game they bottled the Summerside Crystals to a 7-7 tie. Saints' put on a terrific drive in the third period to overcome a 5-2 deficit.

At the end of the first period the score was 3-2 for the Crystals, who added two more unanswered to this in the second session. Then the Saints unleashed their whirlwind attack in the final frame, scoring 5 goals to the Crystals' 2. Saints counted 4 of their 5 tallies in the first 6 minutes to go ahead 6-5. The Crystals lost no time in knotting the score, and then both teams added another marker later in the frame.

Vince Mulligan and Dick Tingley led the Saints' attack with two goals apiece. Singletons went to Sherry, Marshall and Manz. Deighan and Vance Harris each got two for the Crystals with Tucker, G. Harris, and Gaudet getting the others.

The Saints played their best game of the season in their next encounter when they defeated the Penguins 7-4 at the Sports Arena in Charlottetown. After falling behind 1-0 early in the first period, the Saints took over and had things pretty well their own way for the rest of the game. MacIntyre put the Saints on an even footing at 15:39, and Trainor gave them a 2-1 lead late in the period on a slap-shot from the point.

In the second period, the Saints took over where they had left off. Goals by Gillis, Pollack, and Marshall gave the Saints a 5-1 lead before Shepherd and Arsenaault counted again for the Penguins.

In the third session, the Red and White squad again outscored the Penguins, this time 2-1. Tingley and Vince Mulligan were the marksmen for the Saints, while MacDonald scored for the home club. Mul-

ligan's goal was a rarity, coming on a penalty shot awarded when Tingley was pulled down from behind on a breakaway. This victory tied the Saints with the Evinrudes in league standings.

Before the Saints' last encounter of the season, the Evinrudes had moved 2 points ahead by virtue of a 4-0 victory over the Crystals. With their backs to the wall, the Saints took to the ice full of spirit and confidence against the powerful Royals. Only at 17:06 of the final period did the Royals seal the Saints' downfall.

The Saints jumped into an early lead with Wynne denting the twines at 2:31 of the first period. However, 3 goals, 2 of which came in the final 2 minutes of the period, gave the Royals a 3-1 edge.

Dick Manz put the Saints back in contention in the sandwich session when he combined with Tingley for the Saints' second counter. However, Saints could not score again, and Carroll's goal late in the third period spelled doom for the local squad.

The victory gave S.D.U. the N.B. - P.E.I. Intercollegiate basketball crown, and the right to meet the Nova Scotia champ for the Maritime crown.

The Gus MacFarlane-coached Hawks never let the Saints get more than 10 points in front during the first half. At the halfway mark, they were trailing the Red and White five by a mere eight points. But despite all efforts, the Garnet and Gold visitors were unable to contain the Saints in the final session as they were outscored 48-23.

Mount Allison's MacAulay fouled out very early in the game, and proved to be the scapegoat for Blair, McKenney, McCubbin, and Gauld, who followed in MacAulay's tracks.

Although the Mt. A. squad had the height advantage, this did not stop big Frank Garrity from taking control under

# Saints Drop Four In Intercollegiate Play

Saint Dunstan's Varsity Hockey team, who started off their intercollegiate season with a bang as they defeated Mt. A. 7-4 in Sackville, were quickly humbled as they lost their next four tilts to the more powerful Mainland teams.

In their second encounter of the season on January 21, the Saints fell 8-4 victims to St. Thomas. The Saints took the lead three times before succumbing to the St. Thomas attack. Marshall gave the locals a 1-0 lead at 1:25 of the first period. Within 11 seconds Hospodor put St. Thomas on an even footing. Tingley was back 1 minute later when he combined with O'Brien and MacIntyre to give the Saints the lead once again. St. Thomas knotted the score, however, later in the period.

Gillis again put the Saints in the lead at 18:44 of the second period. However, 2 goals within the last 20 seconds of the session put St. Thomas in front to stay; St. Thomas outscored the Saints 4-1 in the last period.

Hospodor was the star of the game as he counted 4 goals and 3 assists.

On the following Saturday, the Garnet and Gold squad from Mount Allison took revenge for their 7-4 beating by soundly trouncing the Saints 10-1. Saints stayed in the game for the first 15 minutes of the tilt. After that there was no doubt about the verdict as the mounties gave the Red and White squad a hockey lesson.

The visiting collegians skated off after the first session with a 2-1 bulge. They fired five unanswered markers in the middle session, and got the only 3 goals in the closing 20 minutes.

Andre DesJardins led the winners with three goals. Ed. MacDonald and Hoffman each notched a pair, and MacKay, Parkinson, and Dave MacDonald counted singletons. Tingley saved the Saints from a white-washing with his first period marker.

The next week-end, the Saints were again soundly beaten, once by the U.N.B. Red Devils and once by St. Thomas. In Fredericton, the Saints counted the first two goals of the game and the last two. However, U. N. B. dominated the play much of the time, especially in the second period where they fired five unanswered markers.

Clark, Cloutier, and defenseman Bob Naylor paced the winners with 2 goals a piece. Marchant and Grant fired singletons. St. Dunstan's goals were tallied by Tingley, Sherry and Gillis, who banged in two.

St. Thomas took over where U.N.B. left off on the following day as they swamped the Saints 12-1. St. Thomas completely dominated the play, scoring 6 goals in the first period, 2 in the second, and 4 in the third. Paul DesRoches spoiled St. Thomas' bid for a shut-out with 30 seconds left in the game, when his shot trickled into the net.

RICKER 128, S.D.U. 73

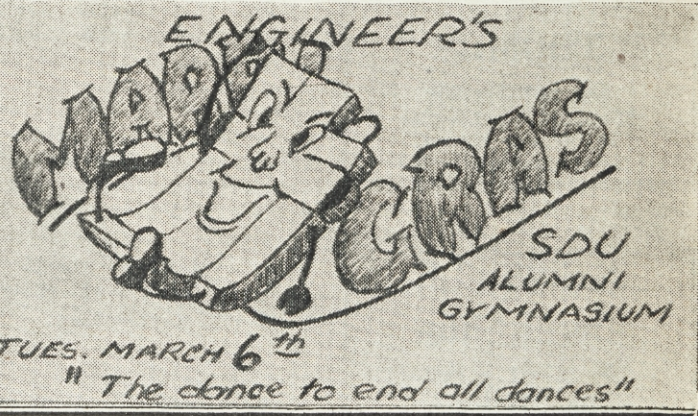
The day before Saints played U.N.B., they dropped an exhibition tilt to Ricker by the lopsided score of 128-73.
