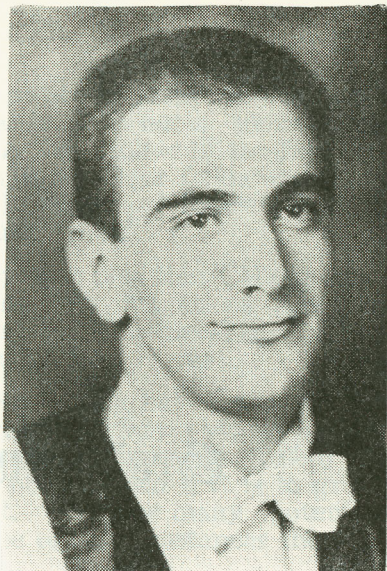

Marcel Guy Baril — Commerce

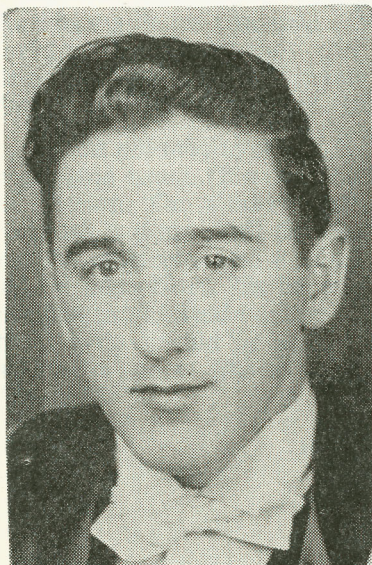
"Quot capita, tot sensus."

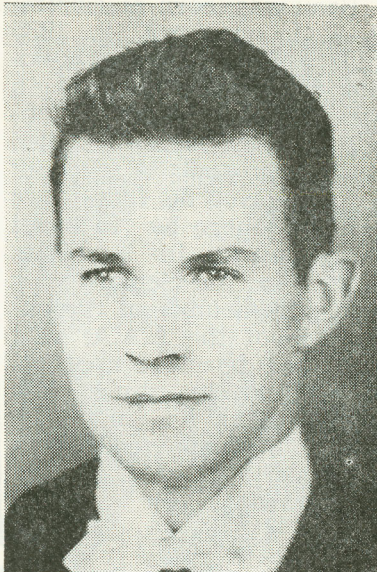
Claude Alexander Callaghan — Arts

Born and received primary education in Alberton.

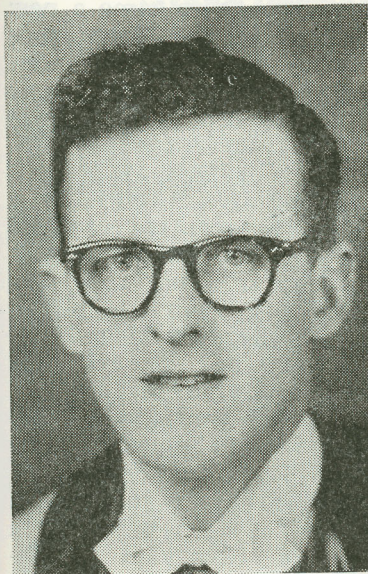
St. Dunstan's

"A Christian is the highest style of man."



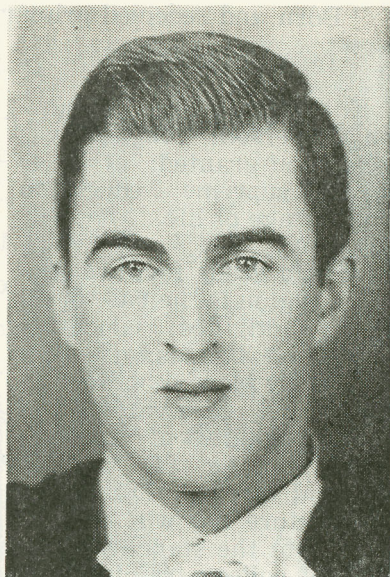

Next year Alton hopes to study Business Administration at the University of Western Ontario. Every success, Alton, in your chosen field!

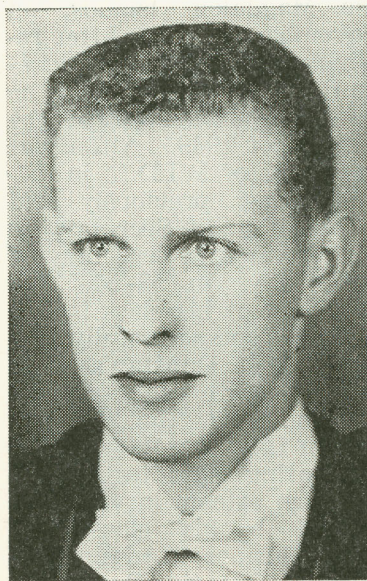
John Basil Campbell — Science

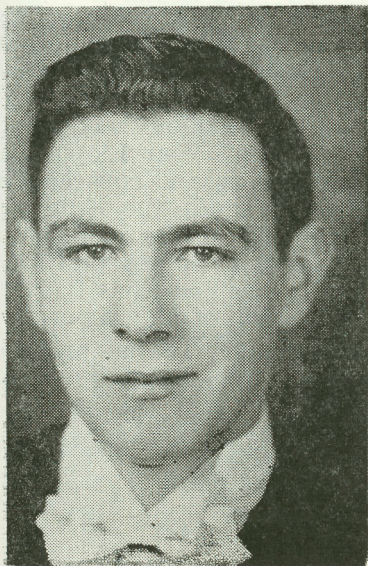
Mary Honora Farmer — Arts

"To labor is the lot of man below."



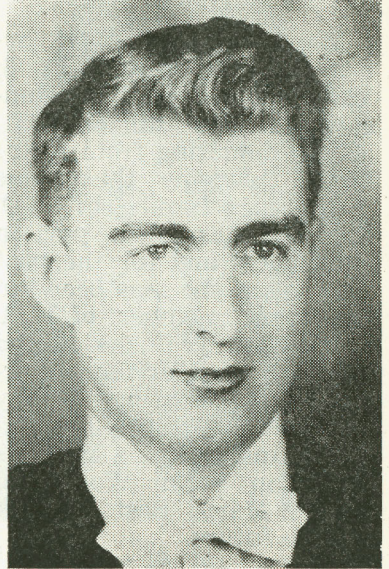

I was born in St. Louis, P.E.I. Enrolled at St. Dunstan's College High School in the fall of 1947.

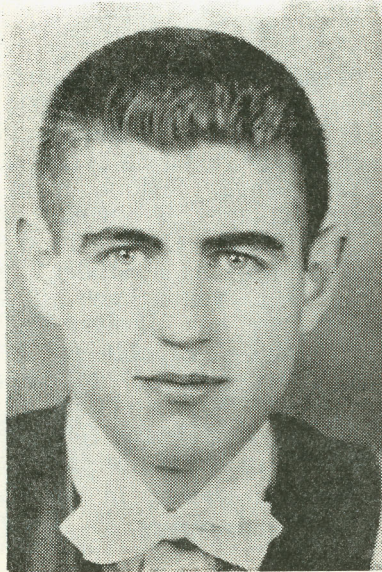

"A man of polite learning and a liberal education."

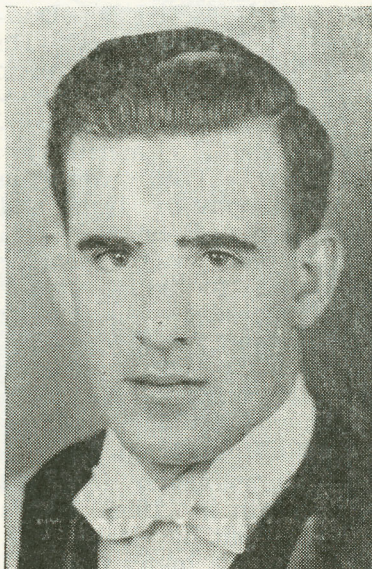

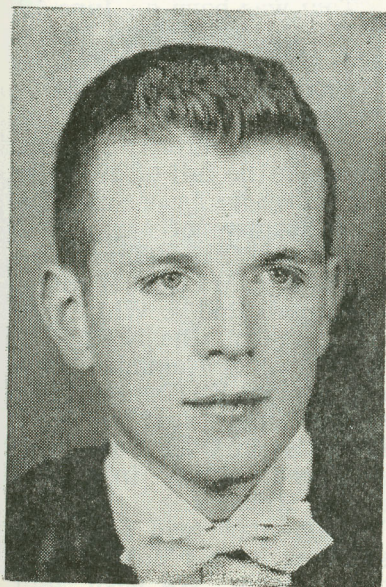
Arnold James Hickey — Arts

**Gerald Johnston — Arts**

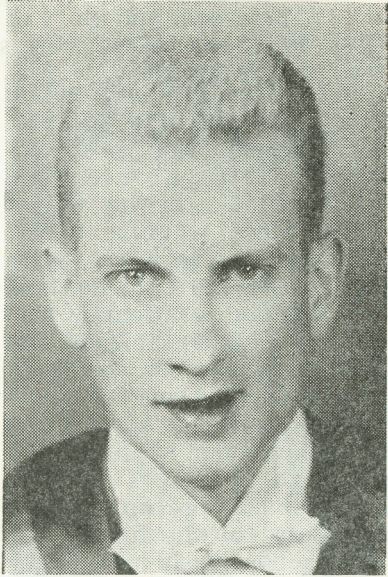

Paul Colin Jay — Science

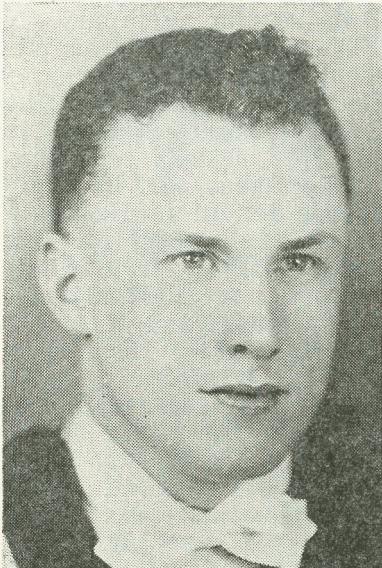
"A Christian gentleman, a true student and a brilliant athlete."

"He builds too low who aims beneath the stars."

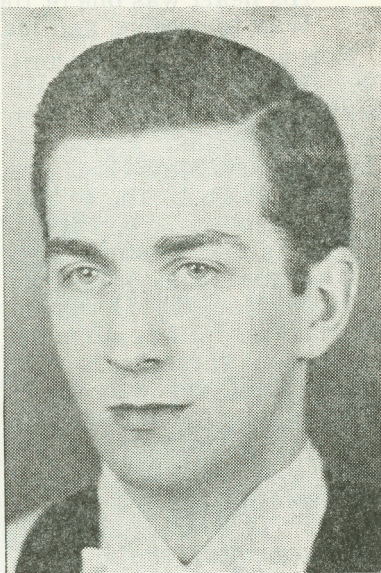

Next year will find Tom studying for his Master's Degree in Social Work at Boston College. We wish him every success in his future endeavors.

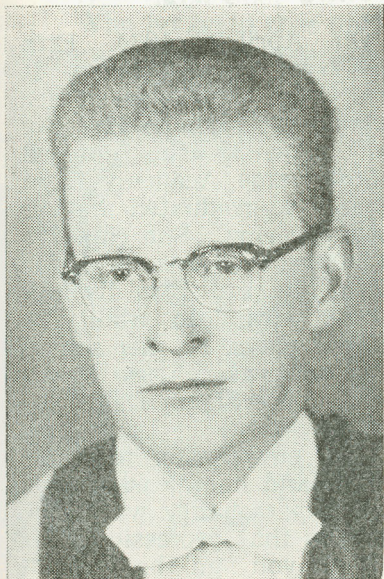
Jean Guy Lemay — Arts

"A pennyworth of mirth is worth a pound of sorrow."

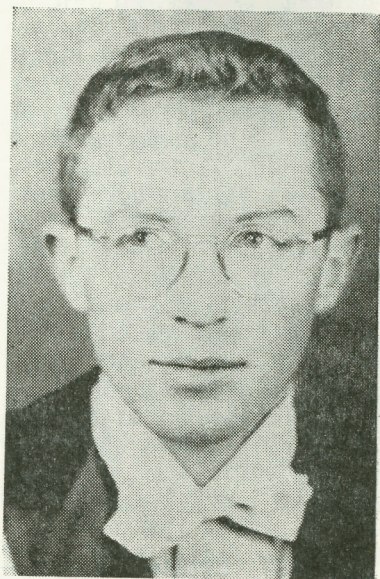

Who honor in thee only what is best."

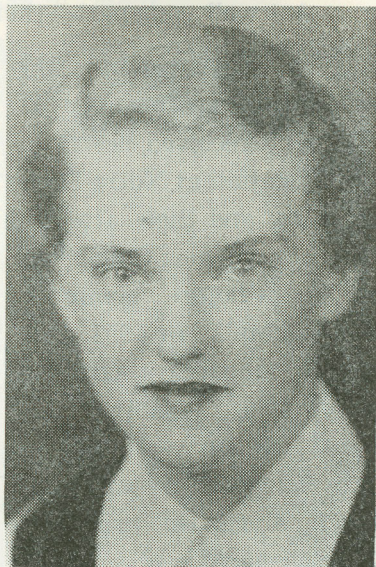

Helen Joan MacDonald — Arts

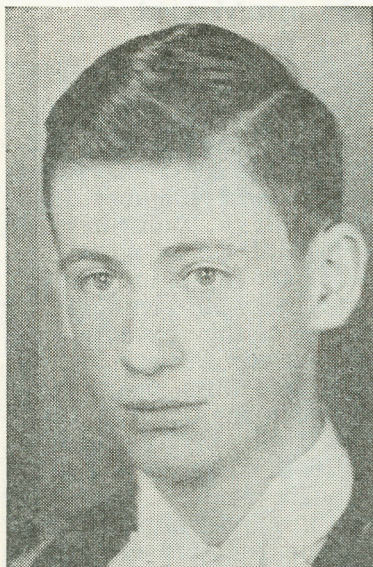
"Her voice was ever soft, gentle and low, an excellent thing in woman."

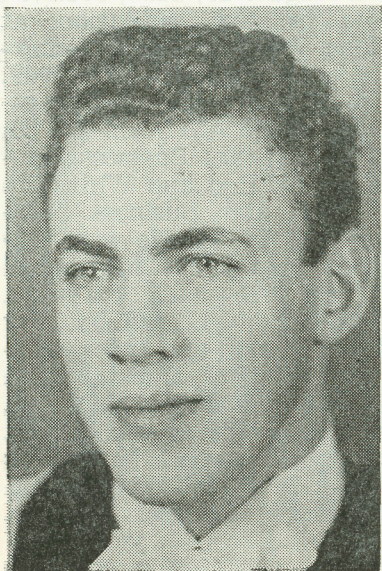
Mark Patricia McGinn — Arts

"An honest man is as good as his word."

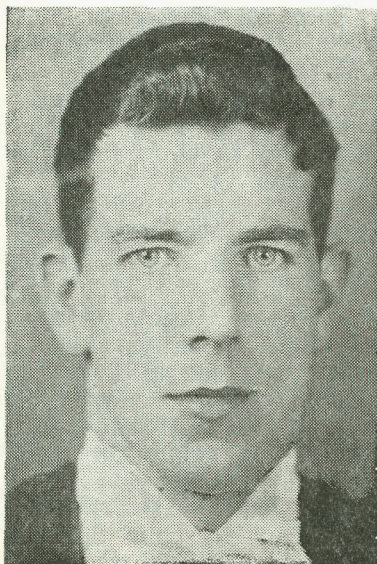

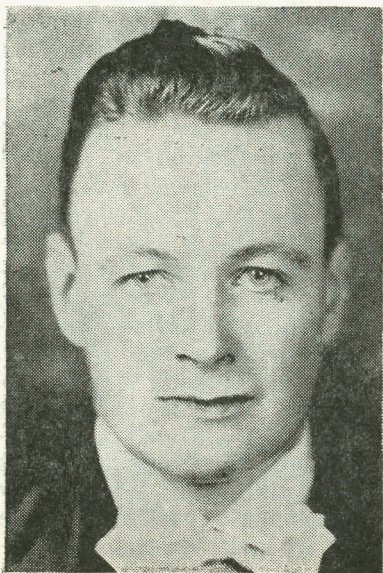
Laurier Richard — Arts

**Thomas John Riley — Arts**

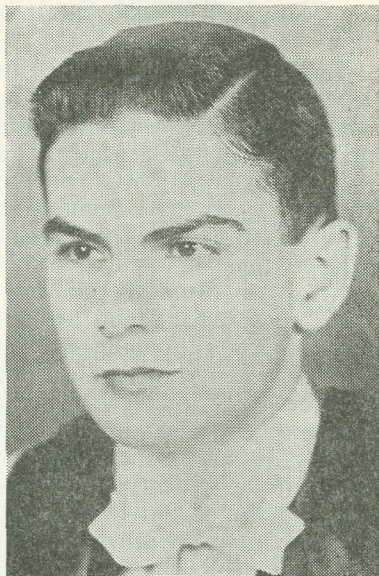
