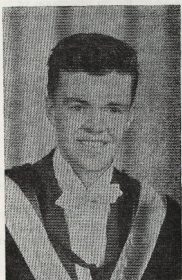

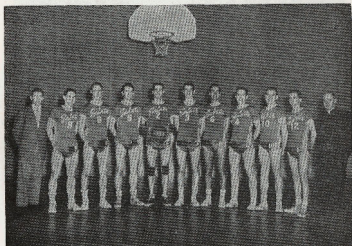
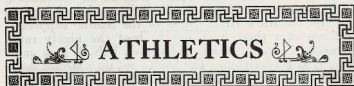

BASKETBALL

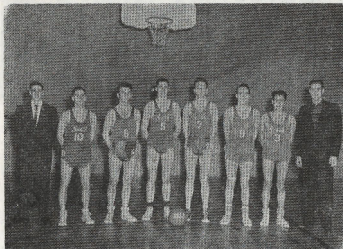
When we last had a chance to tell you about sport at Saint Dunstan's, we mentioned that, although the Saints were eliminated in Intercollegiate play, they would compete in the Maritime Senior B play-offs. Since that time the play-offs have been completed, and once again the Saints failed to become Maritime Champs. However, they did win the N.S.-P.E.I. title in a close and exciting series played at Halifax against the Stadacona Sailors.

The first game was closely played throughout, and at no time did either team have a substantial lead. When the final whistle blew, the scoreboard read 41-41. Team captain Lorne MacGuigan and lanky Gerry Tingley, both of whom have put in a very productive year as far as basketball is concerned, led the Saints in scoring, each earning seventeen points.

The second match, also played in Halifax, was, according to all reports, a thriller from start to finish. At the end of the first half the scoreboard read 16-13 in favor of the S.D.U. five. With less than a minute remaining in the game, the Saints trailed their opponents by three points. Realizing they had to beat the clock as well as the Sailors, they did not despair and gave that last 60 seconds all they had. First Tingley made two foul shots swish through the mesh to put the Saints within one point. Then, with Stadacona in possession of the ball, the Saints fouled deliberately. The Stadacona player missed on his shots, and the long arm of Gerry Tingley reached up and grabbed the ball, he let fly with a long pass that was picked up by Lorne MacGuigan, who made no mistake, as he sent the ball through the rim to give the Red and White squad a one point lead and the N.S.-P.E.I. championship. Bob Fearon and MacGuigan led the Saints in this encounter each giving a 14 pt. performance.

When most of the Students were still on their Easter Holidays, the basketball squad took off for Woodstock, N.B., where they played the New Brunswick champions for the Maritime title. Most of the Saints' supporters did not rate them a chance to beat the highly rated Woodstock squad, which had beaten U.N.B. in a game played at Fredericton. The Saints put up a strong showing losing the first game by 19 points, 61-49. In the second game, Woodstock won this time by 20 points to rap up the Maritime title.

Looking back over the season we thought that at times the Saints played outstanding ball. At other times they did not do so well. In intercollegiate play they did not do as well as expected, but in the Senior B competition they showed themselves to be a strong team. Mike Swift will be the only loss the team will suffer by graduation this year, and, if the remainder of the team return to S.D.U. we think that next year's squad should be quite potent, since all members will have increased in experience along with the possibility of a few new faces.



SECOND TEAM

The Second Saints, when we spoke of them, were engaged in the Island League semi-finals against R.C.A.F. The Saints captured this series in straight games and went on to face the league leaders, the Trotters, in the finals. The Trotters, however, showed a little too much experience and took both games in winning the Island Crown. The first game ended in a 54-36 score, and the

second game was 42-38 against the college hoopsters. Bob Linegar was high man for the Saints, with 7 points in the first game; and in the second game Bill Kelly led the S.D.U. scorers with twelve points. Mark Ladner was high man as he led the Trotters attack with a total of thirty points in the series.

BOWLING

During the past year a new phase was added to the sporting scene at St. Dunstan's in the form of a bowling league. This league was composed of ten teams: two teams from each of the four college years, plus a co-eds team and a faculty team.

On every Saturday afternoon from mid-November onward, all those who wished to participate made their way to the Rollaway for an afternoon of recreation. Although many balls went down the gutter, many enjoyable hours were spent in profitable exercise. Bowling became a popular Saturday afternoon pastime for a number of reasons, not least among which was the fact that the student who lacked a football or hockey physique had a chance to compete and show his skill at a sport in which size and strength are not prime requisites.

When the league schedule was completed the standings were as follows: 1. Team 5 (Sophomore) 2. Team 6 (Sophomores) 3. Team 1 (Seniors); 4. Team 7 (Freshmen); 5. Team 8 (Freshmen); 6. Team 2 (Seniors); and 4 (Juniors) tied; 8. Team 3 (Juniors); 9. Faculty; and 10. Co-eds.

After the first round of the play-offs, the Sophomores, Freshmen, Seniors and Faculty emerged as semifinalists. In the finals the Sophomores beat the Seniors for the championship.

The following are the members of the winning team: Reg Peters, Sandy MacDonald, John Whalen, Leo Shepherd, Dick Ays, and Leonard McCormick. The winners of the individual honors were: High average, Ray Hache with a score of 210. High single was Alyre Gallant with 369, and Ray Hache also had high three with 796.

Now that the league has finished for this year and was such a success, we would like to extend a word of thanks to those students who were instrumental in forming the league and operating it so successfully. I think special praise should be heaped upon Pat McWade, the league president, who was the main man in forming the league. We must also mention Charlie Hickey, the league vice-president, and Claude Peters, who as league secretary had to keep all the statistics.

We hope that the students will see fit to carry on this activity next year and keep the same interest that existed this year. We see that the Athletic Association has donated trophies for the individual winners. This is a commendable move on their part to promote interest in this new sporting activity. Now it is up to we the students. Let us do our part to keep bowling on the agenda for 1958-59.

JUVENILE HOCKEY

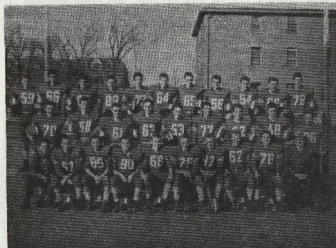


FIRST TEAM
