In Memoriam

Rev. Owen Kiggins

The Rev. Owen Kiggins, former member of the faculty of St. Dunstan's University, died suddenly in Charlottetown on March 6th at the age of 82. Father Kiggins graduated from St. Dunstan's in 1910 and, after four years in the study of Theology at the Grand Seminary of Quebec, was ordained to the priesthood on June 14, 1914, in his native parish of Kelly's Cross. He taught at St. Dunstan's from 1914 to 1923 when he was appointed pastor of the parishes of Georgetown and Montague. He continued as pastor of Georgetown until his retirement in September, 1960.

Father Kiggins will be kindly remembered by many former students of St. Dunstan's where, along with his teaching duties, he also held for some years the offices of bursary and prefect of discipline. In the parishes of Georgetown and Montague he will be remembered as a great pastor of souls who laboured incessantly for the welfare of his people. His funeral took place to St. James Church, Georgetown, on March 9th and his remains were interred in the adjoining cemetery. 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Students' Retreat

The annual students' retreat opened on Friday, March 10, and closed Sunday, March 12. The exercises began with High Mass at 4 P.M. at which the congregation sang the Ordinary and the High School Choir the Propers. Students entered into the spirit of the retreat from the opening gong and most will agree that it was indeed successful. Many day students took advantage of the spare rooms and stayed over at the college for the two days. Sunday evening's Holy Hour followed by the Apostolic blessing ended proceedings and sent all hands away feeling much improved in their inner life.

Fr. Meloche made a deep impression on the student body both with his knowledge of subject matter and in his manner of presenting it. Although called in on short notice, Father was equal to the task and a look at some of his appointments will indicate why that is so. A graduate of Western University, he was ordained in 1941 for the diocese of London. At the moment he is Diocesan Director of Lay Retreats, Executive Secretary of the Lay Retreat Association, Rector, Holy Family Retreat House for the past 14 years, professor of Marriage Theology at the University of Detroit, Retreat Master and Cana lecturer in Canada and the United States, Chaplain, Windsor Police Association and Diocesan Director of Family Life.

The student body is deeply grateful to the College for bringing Fr. Meloche here and we hope that this gratitude will be expressed by daily acts both on and off the campus.
