The S. D. C. A. A. A. in general and our Hockey Team in particular, take this opportunity of extending their sincere thanks to Mr. Cream.

Although we joined the League there was much uncertainty as to whether we could put out a team that would be able to cope with our opponents. Only three of last year s senior men reported for practice, but under the skilful management of the coach Rev. J. C. McDonald and Capt. Fred Kelly, a team of which St. Dunstan's may well be proud, was moulded into shape. The fact that our team won the Intermediate Championship of Prince Edward Island, without meeting a single defeat justifies this assertion.

We have but one thing to say about the rank and file of the opposing teams, namely, that they are good, clean sports. We offer them our heartiest congratulations for the excellent manner in which they conducted themselves during the series and especially for the manly way in which they accepted defeat. The Bankers, of course, were our most formidable adversaries.

Like ourselves, they had to fill some vacant places on their team of last year, but notwithstanding this they put out a strong team. Their goaler certainly knew his business; their defence was anything but weak and their forwards, particularly the centre always played the game. And P. W. C. certainly surprised us. While at no time were they very dangerous opponents, yet, the way they "stayed in the game" to the end of the series, deserves more than passing notice. Like the Bankers, they had a strong man in the nets and, though generally speaking speed and a knowledge of team work were lacking, still some of their players possessed both in a marked degree.

A proper schedule was drawn up for the Inter-Mural Hockey League and under the direction of the officers of the A. A. A., the difficulties of former years in connection with this important branch of our college sports, were completely overcome. Five teams entered the League and the series finished with the Dreadnoughts Champions and "Twistie's" team a close second. Mr. Turcotte, goaler of the Braves team deserves special mention for his sensational stopping considering the weak defence of this team.
