Sinclair & Kelly Make National

Screams rent the air and placards hurled headlong to the floor at the official opening of the National Assembly of World University Service of Canada on Thanksgiving weekend at the University of Montreal. Delegates from universities across the country were amazed at the mobs of angry students who attacked the Centre Sociale where the official opening was held. It was learned with great relief that the unruly reception was intended for three North Vietnamese students scheduled to speak at the same time. However, the rioting U. of M. students, the majority of whom were South Vietnamese refugees, completely ransacked the reception room of the Assembly, destroying all working papers and official documents there.

Despite the unscheduled 'pep rally', the assembly finally got underway with delegates Pat Sinclair, John Grant, and Rev. James Kelly representing S.D.U. New legislation was passed for the coming year with emphasis on the responsibility of the individual local committees for the success or failure of WUSC on their campus.

A motion was introduced to discontinue the program of International Seminars and replace them with a program of student-faculty exchanges for a period of one year in various countries. The motion to end the Seminars immediately was defeated by a small margin but a committee was set up to re-examine the question with no commitments be made for a '69 Seminar until

the report of the committee was examined. Plans for the '68 Seminar in French West Africa were to be completed and local committees were urged to recruit interested students.

The Simon Fraser University delegates were authorized to investigate the possibilities of the Student-Faculty Exchange program and all interested local committees must contact them.

The National Assembly ended Sunday with the election of the twelve National

Committee Members for the '67-'68 term. The committee form the executive governing body for WUSC and is made up of student-faculty members from universities across Canada. This year will see a first for S.D.U. — two of our delegates have been elected to the committee. Pat Sinclair, local WUSC chairman, was chosen, and Rev. James Kelly, who served on the committee last year, was reelected. This is success indeed for it is rare that two committee members are elected from the same university.

"Deux Nations"

"A man who becomes involved" — this was our introduction to Dr. Eugene Forsey who addressed a capacity audience at St. Dunstan's University amphitheatre on Monday, October 16. This was the first in the series of lectures to be held for the coming year.

Dr. Forsey was born in Newfoundland and graduated with first class honours in Economics and Political Science at McGill University and was appointed a Rhodes scholar in 1926. He received his Master of Arts from Oxford and his doctorate from McGill. Long active in matters of high education in Canada, Dr. Forsey is at present a lecturer of political science at Carleton University.

He has written numerous articles for newspapers and journals in the U.S., Canada, and Great Britain on current

affairs in addition to appearing on several television programs.

Dr. Forsey was concerned about the "deux nations" concept in Canada. He began by commenting that no one in Quebec wished to maintain the status quo. He then went on to outline and explain the three different propositions of the French-Canadians in Quebec. They are advocating either "straight outright independence", an associate state with a virtual independent Quebec, or special constitutional status for Quebec.

Dr. Forsey has been indirectly involved with this question for the past four years and his experience and competence as a speaker has made a notable contribution to the centennial lecture series at St. Dunstan's.

Coffee Shoppe To Be Closed Indefinitely?

Yes, this could happen! At the latest Student's Union meeting, October 18, this was a topic of heated discussion.

Last Tuesday, the Coffee Shoppe was so filthy that, in the words of Leo Broderick, "the Department of Health would have closed the place down", hay they seen it. This conference at Alberton is planned to help our present leaders, and future ones, make the most of their time in serving the student body. Also, this conference will give them new ideas and will teach them how to make the most of them. One major problem for discussion will be student apathy and the means of overcoming this perennial problem. The Students' Union is obviously concerned with your welfare.
