REVEREND ALPHONSE ARSENAULT

Since the beginning of the college term, it has been the painful duty of this department to report the death of a number of its alumni. They have been removed from many walks of life. We regret especially to have to chronicle the death of those from among our clergy.

In the midst of the joy that pervades the Christmas Season, the parishioners of Havre-aux-Maisons, M. I., were stricken with grief caused by the death of their beloved pastor, Rev. Alphonse Arsenault. Almost while in the act of offering Holy Mass on December 20th last, Father Arsenault was summoned by death to his Beloved Maker.

Born at Mont Carmel, P. E. I., some forty-one years ago, the late priest attended the parochial school for some years. Then he successively continued his studies at Caraquet, N. B., and at St. Dunstan's College whence he graduated in 1914. In the same year he began the study of Theology at the Grand Seminary of Quebec and was

ordained in the summer of 1918 by His Excellency, Bishop Henry J. O'Leary, now Archbishop of Edmonton, in the parish Church of Mont Carmel, P. E. I.

Father Arsenault then proceeded to the Magdalen Islands where he spent the first twelve years of his sacerdotal life in the interests of the youth as professor and director of Saint Peter's Academy, Etang-du-Nord, M. I. In 1931 he was transferred to House Harbor as parish priest and immediately set to work on a program to better the social and economic conditions among the poor exploited fishermen of that region. A friend to all, he turned his most tender care toward the unfortunate and knew how to encourage the initiative of each one of them.

Alumni will unite in praying with his parishioners and friends for the repose of his soul. Father Arsenault leaves his entire family to mourn: his father and mother, both octogenarians, three brothers and five sisters. To these and former friends and parishioners, *Red and White* extends sincere sympathy. "Requiescat in Pace."

Shortly before Christmas His Excellency, Bishop Francis C. Kelley, of Oklahoma, celebrated the fortieth anniversary of his ordination, and we take this opportunity of extending our somewhat belated felicitations. The priests of his diocese made the event of lasting interest by publishing in a small volume the addresses delivered by His Excellency at the various receptions tendered him on that occasion. These convey messages, very pointed and practical messages, first to his priests, then to his flock, and finally to the general public. They reflect the keynote of his great accomplishments——his never-tiring zeal for the glory of God. How truly could he say with Holy David: "Zelus domus tuae comedit me."

We are justly proud of this distinguished alumnus, but our pride suffereth violence to think he is growing old. Yet forty years of active life in the priesthood means that he is no longer young. Not young in years; still, young in spirit, in ardor, in enthusiasm; young in the fervor of the duties of his office——a successor of the twelve who received the commission: "Go ye and teach" And so we pray that Bishop Kelley's singularly active and useful life may be spared him for many many years.

We further regret to announce to our readers the death of Dr. William Delaney, ex '92. The late Doctor was one of the oldest civil servants in Quebec, having been connected with the Department of Lands and Forests for over fifty-three years. We respectfully offer our sympathy to the bereaved relatives.

News of the accidental death of Mr. Chester Morrissey, ex '28, was received shortly after the New Year. Chester had been on a visit to friends in Boston. His passing is regretted by his former class-mates here. May his soul rest in peace.
