The Share Campaign conducted last week at St. Dunstan's University by the local WUS Committee collected \$240. It was announced last night by WUS Chairman Leo Broderick. The campaign, a project of the WUS Committee, was organized to raise funds to help needy university students throughout the world.

The project included a highly successful slave auction at which students were auctioned for as high as \$9.00 each. The slave auction, held in the Coffee Shop, was conducted by Senior Arts student from N.Y. Jim Lahiff. More than \$120 was made at the auction for the Share fund. The remainder of the \$240 collected during the week came from individual student donations.

In a statement to the Red and White, Mr. Broderick stated: "A unique feature of World University Service (WUS) is the emphasis it places on the material aid to university students in countries all over the world. It is with this emphasis in mind that the local WUS Committee is planning such fund-raising projects as the auction of personal property donated by professors, pie-throwing contests, and student hunger strikes."

The manager of the Share Campaign this year was Lyrus Roberts, a Senior Arts student from Trinidad.

news briefs

Leo Broderick and Ginny Peters represented the campus Liberal Club at the Canadian University Liberal Federation convention in Ottawa this weekend. A feature of the conference was an all party panel. Participating in the panel were youth wing leaders of Canada's political parties. A question period with the Prime Minister, an address by Dr. Frank Underhill, and policy sessions rounded off the scheduled program. Many of the federal cabinet ministers and prominent Liberal M.P.'s participated in the convention.

The St. Dunstan's University winter carnival queen has been chosen, it was announced this morning by a carnival committee spokesman. The queen was chosen by a panel of three judges which interviewed the six candidates last Saturday. The decision of the panel will be released at the carnival ball Saturday, February 18. Members of the panel were Walthen Gaudet, Mrs. A. Mulligan, and Dr. Kent Irwin.

The snow sculpture competition for the Centennial Winter Carnival, of which the SDU is a participant, has been divided into four divisions — university, high school, service and local business. An interclass competition will be held at St. Dunstan's. The winning entry will then compete in the centennial sculpture competitions. Trophies for winning entries are being donated by the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

A date has been announced by the St. Dunstan's Debating Society for the intercollegiate debate with Mt. St. Bernard. The two universities will debate in the Science Building amphitheatre February 27. Philip Macdonald and Wayne MacKinnon will debate for St. Dunstan's. They will support the affirmative of the resolution that the academic freedom of the university is threatened today.

Three new additions have been made to the staff of the Red and White. Doug Richard, a Senior English major from Montreal, and Michael Chinourd, a history major from Rumford, have been added to the circulation department. Bob Donahue from Montreal has taken over as advertising manager. He succeeds Gerld Jones who resigned from the staff recently.

Copies of the Students Directory, this year published by the Students' Union, are available in the Library to all registered students, it was announced recently by Union officials. The Directory, last year published by the CUS Committee, includes the Constitution and By-Laws of the Students' Union, names of Union officials, a financial report, the names of campus organizations and executives, the basketball and hockey schedules, and the names of all students attending St. Dunstan's. There is no charge to the students for the booklet.

Charley McMillan, a Senior Arts student from Charlottetown, and Errol Sharpe, a Junior Arts student from Kensington, P.E.I., defeated the Canadian Coast Guard College from Sydney, N.S., February 5th, in an intercollegiate debate at St. Dunstan's. The S.D.U. debaters won a unanimous decision supporting the negative of the resolution that "Canada should abolish its Armed Forces."

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Formal Resolutions Passed By S. D. U. Students' Council

A series of formal resolutions running, and in the case of a tie between two candidates, shall cast the deciding ballot. The electoral officer will not have a regular vote in the elections.

The resolution on finances provides for mandatory monthly financial reports from the Council, the Coffee Shoppe, and the Student Store; and the Treasurer shall co-sign all cheques of any bank account or of any temporary account.

Moreover, audited financial statements of the corporation's operations must be sent bi-annually to the University President, the Bursar, and Chairman of the Board of Governors. This provision is meant to assure tighter security for Union borrowing.

The resolution governing elections provides the Executive with a guideline for running all future general and class elections. Provisions have been made for such bottlenecks as tie votes; more than three people running when one doesn't get a majority; and when one candidate withdraws his name from the election. A new feature of the resolutions is that in future general elections, the Students' Union president will not be the electoral officer. Instead, he will be chosen with the consent of the candidates

per cent of any annual surplus, as well as the accumulative interest. This fund shall be used for future permanent physical facilities or major new equipment for the Union.

Other resolutions expected to come up shortly concern the Debating Society, and the appointment of the Editors of the Red and White and Yearbook.

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
