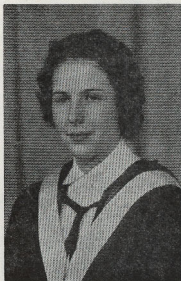


Class of '58 Graduates

MAUREEN ANN BEAGAN—ARTS

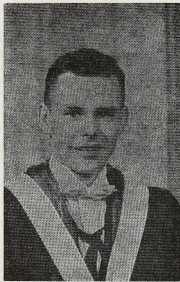
*"A winning smile, a happy face,

In soul and aspect as in age"*

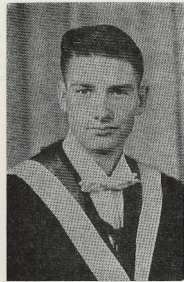

JOHN CHARLES CAMPBELL—ARTS

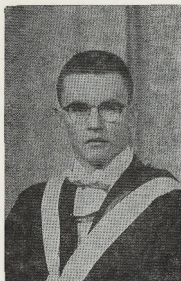
"By the work, we know the workman"

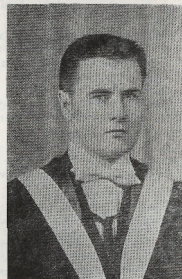
**MARY DOREEN CUSACK—ARTS**

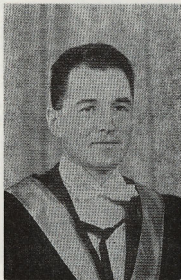

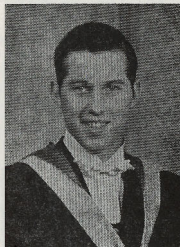
MAURICE E. GAUTHIER—SCIENCE

"All would be well if there were no buts"

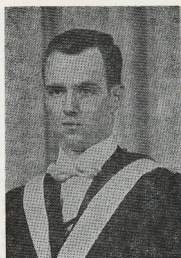

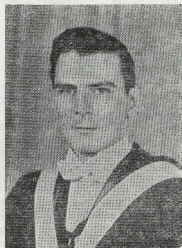
**BRIAN DAVID McCALLUM—ARTS**

**JOHN WILLARD McCARRON—ARTS**

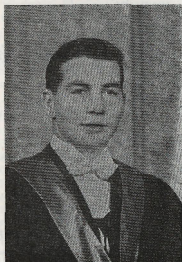
"Ahl the charm of common people; God must have loved them much, he made so many of them"
