STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The Students' Union, the chief governing body of student activities on the campus, is functioning quite efficiently. Several new projects have already been proposed, and some have even been realized. Among the latter has been the procuring of a new site for the canteen. It is now located in the room adjoining the book-store. This room is much larger than the old one, and, consequently, makes for better service. A frigidaire has also been provided. The manager, Mr. St. Clair Gallant, reports a thriving business.

In former years the written constitutions of the different societies on the campus have been placed in separate pamphlets. This year the Students' Union has decided to amalgamate them all into a single handbook. It is expected that this handbook will be in print in the very near future, and will be made available to every student. This will give the students a chance of becoming better acquainted with the government and aims of the various societies.

Another project which the Students' Union has undertaken consists in the setting up of an Employment Agency on the Campus. The need for such an Agency is quite apparent. Its aims will be to provide both summer and permanent employment for the students. A committee has been appointed to look into the matter. It is hoped that the Agency will be in operation in a very short time.

Standardization is a much discussed topic at Student Body and Student Executive meetings. An attempt is being made this year to standardize all crests, rings, uniforms, etc. The question, however, is still under discussion, and it will be a while yet before it will be ironed out completely.

The two after Christmas will see our debators facing teams from St. Mary's College and Acadia University. The former will take place in Charlottetown, the latter at Acadia. At a meeting of I.S.S. held in Kingston, Ontario from October 22-24 the Faculty-Advisor of our unit, Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley, was chosen as Faculty-Advisor for all Maritime Colleges and Universities. **Red and Whit**e extends congratulations to Father O'Hanley on his appointment.
