# Are We Behind the times?

In an age which has witnessed the greatest advance in the history of mankind, the Catholic Church steadfastly condemns the use of contraceptives. Why?

This is the age of complexes, neroses and psychoses, not the stone age. This is 1964 A.D. not 1964 B.C. The Church's attitude remains the same. Why?

Today we can communicate, indeed travel, to any part of the globe in a matter of hours. We can send rockets to the moon, orbit men in space and split the atom. Yet Catholicism has the same attitude now as in its origin. Why?

The purpose of the contraceptive is to prevent birth. Whether it is an effective method or not is not at issue. What is the basis for the Church's objection to their use? She maintains that the purpose of martial union is procreation. The contraceptive's objective is to frustrate the martial act and on this basis the Church objects.

Modern science, by a study of the process of ovulation, tells us that in most cases conception is impossible anyway. Does this mean that the Catholic Church should change Her mind? No., in fact this is an argument against the use of contraceptive devices.

The argument heard most often to support use of these devices is the population explosion. There can be no doubt that in some countries there is a very great need bor birth prevention.

Man is a rational animal. As such he has both an intellect and a will. By education he develops his mind. By self-control he develops his will. This is the best answer to the problem of birth control and it is the one offered by the Catholic Church. By self-control one can be certain that conception will not occur.

The principles of morality are eternal and their validity is timeless. This is why the Church's attitude is the same. What was sinful in the beginning has not become less so with time. Moreso in our own age than in any other, we have a distinct need forself-control, the base of morality. Today it remains the greatest asset which a man can possess in an field of endeavour.
