Broadway Comedy Performed at Centre by Dalhousie University Students

The Dalhousie Glee and Dramatic Society performed the noted Broadway comedy "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way to the Forum..." to a near capacity crowd at the Confederation Centre Theatre last Saturday.

The play itself was entertaining and its execution, by the Dalhousie players, was commendable as an amateur production. Response from the audience to some of the innuendo seemed slow in parts, but, on the whole, the audience reaction proved more than favourable; the applause at the finish echoed throughout the theatre for more than five minutes.

BEST PERFORMANCE

Terry De Wolf's interpretation of the lead role, Pseudolus, was the best dramatic performance of the evening. Although he does not have a good singing voice, his excellent acting ability and almost professional movement on stage more than made up for his inconsistent delivery of the songs, particularly since his role did not necessitate a good voice.

Hamilton McClymont, how-

ever, who played Hero, had an excellent voice, one which was essential to the role he was playing, but he was a bit too restrained in his dramatic rendition, even though he was basically a good actor.

Doug French as Sexex, Peter Pentox as Lycus, and Nancy White as Domina each did extremely well on stage. They had good singing and speaking voices. Peter was very much the character he was portraying and presented the role well to the audience. Nancy acted well. Even though she had laryngitis, she carried off her songs unfazed like the trouper she is.

DIFFICULTY

Three actors who experienced noticeable difficulty with their roles, in my opinion, were Danny McSweeney as Hysterium, who I thought did not get into his part and project it until the latter half of the show; Colin Duerden as Miles Glorious, who wasn't getting his character across to the audience even though he seemed involved; and Isabel Darby, who was simply ill-at-ease on stage.

An excellent job in a small

part, particularly appreciated by the audience, was achieved by Peter Ray, playing the role of Erronius.

A few interesting facts are: Did you notice the Playboy Bunny on the vest of Miles Glorious? The black garters on the courtesans during the mock death of the virgin? Nancy White's false nose suddenly being stepped upon by someone on the stage floor? Ian Henderson, one of the courtesans, whose orange bikini costume stretched by a trip to the cleaners kept sliding down? She did a good cover-up job on that, I thought.

The actors were thrilled to be working in the Confederation Centre Theatre. And, though, as Terry DeWolf remarked, they suffered a strain on their voices because of the theatre size, Peter Hinton and Terry agree that the Centre gave to the play a superior quality.

The co-operation and friendliness of these students, most of whom are studying drama or like Terry and Peter, aspiring to be professional actors, was a great thing to see.

Recognition is due to David

Pentox, of the Neptune Theatre in Halifax, who designed the make-up for the play. A real work of art. Moreover, Chris Brookes deserves mention for his superb direction of the play.

Agrees To Student-Faculty Committees

SASKATOON (CUP) — The president of the University of Saskatchewan told student councillors last week he could see no reason for students not participating on some Faculty Council committees.

Speaking at a recent council meeting, Dr. J. W. T. Spinks commented on a student brief which asked for more student participation in university government.

The brief suggested that all Faculty Council meetings be open to students, that minutes of council committee meetings be available to students, and that students be allowed to participate actively on any committees of mutual interest to students and faculty.

QUESTIONNAIRE

This Questionnaire was compiled and circulated by a students interest group, consisting of both P.W.C. and S.D.U. students, who are concerned about the question of Higher (university) Education on P.E.I.

The purpose of the Questionnaire was to test public and, more particularly, student opinion regarding this question.

The compiled results of the Questionnaire reveal some interesting facts. Without completely reiterating the revealed statistics, it is interesting to observe that 87.2% of the total of 516 people questioned feel that this question has not been adequately considered and publicized; 85.8% feel that the present plans announced by both P.W.C. and S.D.U. need further study; 95.4% feel that this total question needs further study; 83.3% would be interested in a public teach-in; 87.5% see the question of Higher Education as a personal concern; 34.6% have read some or all of the proposals; and 62.2% indicate that they have seriously considered this question.

These facts indicate a great deal of dissatisfaction with the trends which have been developing in the field of Higher Education on P.E.I.

A great deal of time and effort has been contributed by the students who worked on this project. We only hope that the somewhat startling results of this survey do not get lost in a sea of apathy and a bureaucracy filled with self interest.

QUESTIONS ASKED

1. Have you seriously considered the question of higher education on P.E.I.?
2. Have you studied any of the proposals that have been presented (i.e. Royal Commission Report, Citizens Committee Report, etc.)?
3. Do you feel that the issue of Higher Education on P.E.I. is of concern to you?
4. Do you feel that this issue has been adequately considered and publicized?
5. Do you feel that the present plans of action announced by P.W.C. and S.D.U. need further consideration?
6. Would you be interested in seeing the question of Higher Education on P.E.I. examined further?
7. Would you be interested in a public teach-in dealing with this education question?
