MIDL Conference Held At Acadia

On October 7, Ed Benson and John Dunphy attended the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating Conference at Acadia University as delegates for St. Dunstan's. The chairman for the meeting was Hugh Gibbons, the league president. Other universities with delegates present were St. Mary's, Dal., St. Thomas, St. F.X., King's, and U.N.B. Both U.N.B. Law and Mt. A. did not have delegates attending the conference.

This debating conference is an annual affair at which the intercollegiate debating schedule is drawn up, topics are chosen to be submitted to C.U.D.A. as the suggestions of the Maritimes for the national debating tournament, and at which constitutional changes are made, and problems of the league discussed, should such be necessary.

The main achievement of the conference was the admission of Memorial University to league membership; it was fortunate that Memorial was seeking admission since it had been necessary to expel U.N.B. Law because of its lack of interest and inactivity in intercollegiate debating during the past few years.

After having agreed upon an eliminating technique, the following debating topics were selected to be sent to C.U.D.A.: Resolved (1) that abortion be made legal in Canada, (2) that Quebec secede from confederation and (3) that Canada should support England's entry into the Common Market. St. Dunstan's, St. F.X., and St. Mary's asked that it be recorded in the conference minutes that they were completely opposed to the first resolution as the subject matter for any debate, and moreso, because it is intended as the possible topic

for a national debate.

S.D.U., motivated by an unhappy past experience, moved that a new article be added to the constitution to the effect that the debating trophy be forwarded to the league executive before the end of February so that they could in turn forward it to its winner before the end of March. The conference adopted the new addition to the constitution.

It is to be regretted that the Maritime Model Parliament has been postponed this year because no university was keen on accepting the obligation. U.N.B., however, has indicated that it might carry out the project next year and was given the option for it for next year.

A change in the constitution that would have permitted any university to use three professors as judges was rejected overwhelmingly.

As a condition of Memorial's entry into the league, a kind of pool system was set up in which the university or universities scheduled to debate Memorial would receive ten dollars from each of the other universities to lessen the cost involved therein. The purpose of this is to avoid the situation that a Students' Council be asked for a bulky sum when it is time for its university to debate at Memorial.

Lastly, the debating schedule that has been adopted puts St. Dunstan's in an "away" debate at St. Mary's and in two "home" debates against Mt. A. and St. Thomas.

It would not be fitting in this report that neglect be given to a recognition of the excellent hospitality that Acadia accorded the delegates. One delegate to the conference asked for a definition of hospitality. Acadia answered his query — not in words but in action.
