Our minds may immediately jump to financial assistance to exemplify such activities. During the banquet, which was tendered by the College, several speakers eloquently voiced their appreciation of St. Dunstan's, and proclaimed readiness to prove their devotion to the motto, "Ex eodem fonte, fides et scientia," and to all it stands for.

Since then, we understand, the Executive has been active. A meeting was held to formulate some definite plans of procedure. It was agreed that the first step must be to get in touch with as many of the Alumni as possible. This is a gigantic task, and demands the assistance of all who can furnish information. It is earnestly hoped that all who are called upon to do so will generously aid the committee as far as lies in their power. This Executive is zealous and energetic, and we can see no reason why their efforts will not mean much for the future welfare of "Old St. Dunstan's."
