

The first league game took place Oct. 22nd and, under ideal conditions, was an ideal game. Hectic from the opening to the concluding whistle, the game left little to be desired so far as football was concerned, except a few fumbles. The Saints, working together and in better condition, forced their weightier and perhaps individually better rivals every moment, but were forced themselves to tackle hard and frequently to stop the RED and BLACK

from breaking through.

In the opening canto the Abbies started a kicking game which netted them little territory, and the battle waged back and forth almost at the center of the field. On the Abbie forty-yard line the Saints were given a penalty kick, which resulted in the first tally, when Frank McMillan made the prettiest kick seen here for years, to split the uprights almost at dead center. The Abbies surged forward in great RED and BLACK waves and beat upon the Saints' defences only to be rolled back. In the first minute of the second period the Saints again scored, when a fumble on the part of an Abbie quarter gave Duffy an opportunity of which he took immediate advantage who, in a burst of speed scooped up the ball, flashed past his astonished opponents to plant the pigskin behind the bars in true gridiron style for a try that went unconverted. The Abbies then desperately and irresistibly fought their way to the Saints' five yard line; there a scrum ensued, and the ball coming out the Abbie side, was quickly snatched up by Hunter, their dexterous little quarter who slithered over for a try, unconverted. Both teams now fought with might and main without result for the score stood 6 to 3 at the concluding whistle.

The second and final league game took place Nov. 11th. and was one of the most gruelling in years. The Saints faced a rejuvenated and determined team, who were out for blood. From the kick-off, both teams threw themselves precipitously into the fray; scrums were frequent, interspersed with lightning runs, and hard, vicious, tackles. The Saints were forced to their five yard line and a sure try was more than once averted by a timely kick. The RED and WHITE all the while kept up a running attack on the Abbies and endeavored to keep the ball always in play. The first half ended scoreless. The second half was a mate of the first; both teams working hard, fighting and contesting every inch, had the fans constantly on their toes as they followed the play with breathless interest. In the scrum the Abbies controlled the ball, but fast following up, coupled with hard tackles, rendered this advantage

useless. This deadlock continued to the last minute of the play, when the Saints were awarded a penalty kick about thirty-five yards from the bars. The ball was given to McMillan, our quarter with the educated boot, who amid a breathless hush duplicated his feat of the previous game, giving the Saints by the small margin of a penalty kick the game, series, and title for 1932 of which, considering the obstacles and handicaps, they might well be proud.

Intercollegiate Football

The first mixup between the two college teams took place Oct. 19th, in which the Saints came out at the short end to the tune of 6 to nil. The game was essentially a forwards game although good runs and many substantial gains were made by the back fields. The Saints' scrum had control of the ball, but this was nullified by the fast breaking wings of their opponents' formation. The play weaved back and forth till a break came which was immediately taken advantage of by Gaudet, husky BLUE and RED forward, who pierced the Saints' defences for a try, unconverted. The RED and WHITE aggregate forced their opponents the rest of the period and threatened momentarily to score. In the second canto of the fracas the Saints were at first driven back, but rallying, drove their aggressors within their own line and there began a systematic hammering, to force an opening, but costly fumbles soon brought them back again to the defensive, where following a kick, Owen swelled the RED and BLUE total with another unconverted try. Undismayed the Saints launched offensive after offensive, but could not surmount the P. W. C. barriers, thus leaving the final score 6 to nil.

In the second game with their rivals on Nov. 7th, the Saints fared better, and came out the winners by the scant margin of a convert. Both teams had considerably improved and put up a fight well worth viewing. The first half developed at times into a kicking duel, and produced the only two tallies of the game; the first was a beautiful kick made by Owen negotiated on a penalty for the city team, the second for the Saints by Steve Gillis who, snaring the ball as it shot from the scrum, sped over the P. W. C. line before his opponents realized what had happened. The second half saw the Saints forced by the BLUE and RED forwards, who now assumed the role of invaders and camped uncomfortably near the Saints' line, till the situation was relieved by judicious kicking. Our half line seemed to have forgotten their judgement and tried to carry the ball instead of booting it, and so kept the ball almost continuously within their line as they were smothered by the P. W. C. forwards. Nevertheless, the S. D. U. lines were so stoutly defended, that try as they would the BLUE and RED fifteen were unable to negotiate a deciding tally.

The second half witnessed the Saints as completely dominant, keeping the play always in the city boys terrain, where fierce melees marked the resting place of the ball. Dunn broke out of one such melee and carried the ball over, but the try was disallowed. The Saints tried several kicks at the bar, but to no avail. In the dying moments of the game the Saints strove furiously against time to turn defeat into victory and to retain the title, but failed by a hair's breath for the terminating whistle saw them forcing, ever forcing the P.
