PROFS. ON POT

WINNIPEG (CUP)—Four University of Manitoba professors recently told the campus paper they smoke pot.

One of the four, a lecturer in the English department, told the Manitoban use and support of pot among his colleagues in the department is rising. He said the incidence of pot smoking among his students is "fantastically high."

The issue came up on campus in the wake of a meeting of the Deans' Council which met to discuss possible drug regulations for the campus.

One of the other three professors, all fine arts lecturers, said smoking pot is a "very personal thing. Every experience with the drug is involved and complicated." He added not all pot experiences were good.

None of the lecturers were reluctant to discuss the subject for publication, though they asked that their names be withheld.

The English lecturer said people who could never see symbolism in English literature were able to do so after a pot-smoking session.

He said before smoking pot he often wondered if studying literature was of any value. He said the pot experience reassured him that those insights which had induced him to begin studying English in the first place were sound.

University of Waterloo, withdrew from the contest the day of the balloting.

The plenary elected Peter Gzowski editor of Star Weekly Magazine, honorary president of the student press service.

For the first time next year the national president will complete a full 13-month term in office, overlapping with the incoming president.

Other officers selected at the conference are: Elly Alboim, McGill Daily, as bureau chief; Bob Parkins, The Varsity, University of Toronto, Field Secretary; and Linda McKenzie of the Cord Weekly, Waterloo Lutheran University as executive secretary.

The president's term of office begins May 1. The other officers begin work in August and September, 1968.

Dalhousie Eases Up on Entrance Requirements

HALIFAX (CUP) — Dalhousie University has liberalized its entrance requirements.

University president H. D. Hicks said the changes will "place more emphasis on the quality of the student as reflected by his whole school record, and less on the rigid and formal senior matriculation examination."

The University will adopt a point system similar to that in operation in Ontario for admitting students.

The points system, said Dr. Hicks, will give a better chance to many students who were denied entrance by the rigid technicalities in the previous entrance rules.

Dal was the first Atlantic region university to require grade 12 instead of grade 11 for admission. The points system will relax reliance on grade 12 marks.

Debating Gets off the Ground

A series of trial debates were held to select debaters for the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating Tournament which begins the last week of January.

Two debates are scheduled, one at home and one January 27 in St. John's, Newfoundland. Home debaters against U.N.B. Feb. 7th are Connie Cullen and Bob O'Rourke. They uphold the negative of the topic, "Resolved that Canada suffers from a lack of national unity and purpose."

At St. John's, Paul Batchilder and Ellen MacDonald support the negative of the topic, "Resolved that the Canadian Confederation Experiment is a Success," against Memorial University.

The Society needs more members to ensure that the reputation of S.D.U. debating be upheld in future years; to this end an intramural debate will be held on Saturday, Jan. 27 during the Carnival: Juniors vs. Senior, and Freshmen vs. Sophomore. Winners will compete in final for the trophy at approximately 4:00 p.m. Saturday.
