

SAINTS HOST MOUNTIES IN LAST HOME GAME

Jack Kane's SDU Saints play their last home game of the year this Saturday when they meet Dick VanSnick's Mount Allison Mounties. However, the key to this game rests with the results of the St. F. X.-UNB game of the night before. The situation is this: St. Dunstan's has three games remaining: Mount A., UNB and St. Thomas, and they have yet to drop a point. UNB has lost one game

and tied another, thus dropping three points. St. F. X., by virtue of their loss to St. Dunstan's, has lost four points.

Now if St. F. X. beats UNB Friday, the Red Devils will have dropped seven points, thus putting St. Dunstan's in a position where they can lose two games instead of one. This means that a SDU win over Mount Allison makes it all over, and clinches the title for the Saints for the first time in 18 years. If UNB happens to beat St. F. X., a not unlikely situation, because they have the advantage of home ice, then another possibility arises.

St. Dunstan's would have to beat either St. Thomas or UNB on the road trip March 5-6. Only three losses in the Saint's remaining three games would give St. F. X. a chance at the title. Saturday's game starts at 2:00 o'clock sharp and will be aired over CFCY radio.

Incidentally, students and faculty are asked to pay admission to this crucial encounter to help defray costs of the trip to Saskatoon.

SAINTS EXTEND STREAK TO 8-0

Saint Dunstan's University Varsity Saints made it eight in a row last Saturday when they downed the Saint Thomas University Tommies 11-4. The game, which at times seemed sloppy and one-sided, was the Saints second last home game of the year. The score was kept quite even until the second period when the Saints broke into a gallop leaving the Tommies scrambling to catch up.

George Monaghan just couldn't do anything wrong as four times he found the target to beat Bill Nestor in the St. Thomas net. Bill MacMillan upped his league-leading goal production to 17 by way of a hat trick while Maurice Roy scored twice. Defenceman Derrel Pollock and centreman Andre Gelinas rounded out the scoring for the Saints.

The game was relatively rough with stiff bodychecks being handed out on both sides. As a result of these rough-house tactics, referee Dewar Judson called 18 penalties with eleven of these going to Saint Thomas. This probably sets the stage for a heads-up game the next time these two clubs meet at Fredericton in two weeks time.

The Saints have yet to lose this season, and with only three games remaining they are in good contention for a Maritime Championship. Next Saturday brings Mount "A" to our campus for a crucial game. A victory over Mount "A" coupled with a loss by UNB to St. Francis, would clinch a Maritime Championship for St. Dunstan's.

Or was it after Christmas when they humbled UNB Red Devils here 5-3? Perhaps the X game of February 1st vintage marked the starting point.

The fact is, the Saint's drive for a Maritime Championship took place better than three years ago, when the present coach, Jack Kane Jr., accepted the job from Father Frank Ledwell, who had just completed two unhappy seasons with the team. And the outlook ahead was none too good either.

Over the summer months, some high school dropouts were persuaded that they should resume their scholastic endeavours, and that they would be accepted into the Intercollegiate hockey ranks. Then some changes were made in the schedule. In the fall, several intramural stars were told that with enough work, they would play Varsity—regular shifts even. Furthermore, a winning spirit was instilled in the players.

DOWN SIX GOALS

He was laughed at, of course, but Jack Kane brought the Saints out of the wilderness. There weren't any stars, but the 16 players had a spirit that could overcome overwhelming obstacles. Remember when St. F. X. was down 5-1 two weeks ago going into the third period? Two years ago our Saints were down 7-1 against X, and only a third period goal by St. F. X. denied them a victory. At the end of the year, league statisticians found the Saints' lodged in fourth place in a field of nine.

Last year, with several new and younger players, St. Dunstan's became a nationally ranked team and finished in first place for the first time in 17 years. The tale is so fresh that it hardly needs any mention here.

And the same for this year's feats. We are now unbeaten in eight games; ranked number one in the nation; and bound for Saska-

Saint Francis Xavier University, led by Dave Barry's 33 point output, handed the Saint Dunstan's University Saints a 100-62 loss in a Maritime Intercollegiate Basketball game at Antigonish last Saturday. This marked the eighth consecutive loss for the Saints, who have yet to post a victory his year, while the win gave St. F. X. a 6-2 won-lost record for the season.

The X-Men built up a 45-35 half time lead before making loose for 55 second-half points as compared to SDU's 27. Despite their relatively low point production, the Saints has a respectable 37 per cent average from the floor as compared to St. F. X.'s 39 per cent. From the foul line it was 14 out of 22 for the Saints, and 24 out of 37 for the victors.

While Barry's 33 points made him top scorer for the game, Bob Francouer led the Saint's attack with 22 points and Len Sirois netted 11. Ed Lawlor posted 11 points also, and Jacques Desserault scored 8.

The Saints play two home games this weekend. Friday night they meet UNB Red Raiders at 8:00

and then Saturday afternoon they host St. Mary's University Huskies at 1:30.

Sirois In 6th Place

Len Sirois of St. Dunstan's is now in sixth position in the Maritime Intercollegiate Basketball Conference, according to statistics released by league headquarters. Sirois has 153 points in 9 games for a 17 point average. Steve Konchalski of Acadia and Dave Barry averages. Konchalski has 220 of St. F. X. lead the race with 23.4 points in 9 games; Barry has 187 in eight games.

Bob Francouer of St. Dunstan's holds down twelfth spot with 127 points netted in nine games for a 14.1 average.

Acadia University Axmen have all but clinched their fourth straight Read Cup with their 9-0 record. They lead St. Mary's by a game and a half. The winner goes against the top teams in Canada at the national playoffs.

STUDENT COMMITTEE

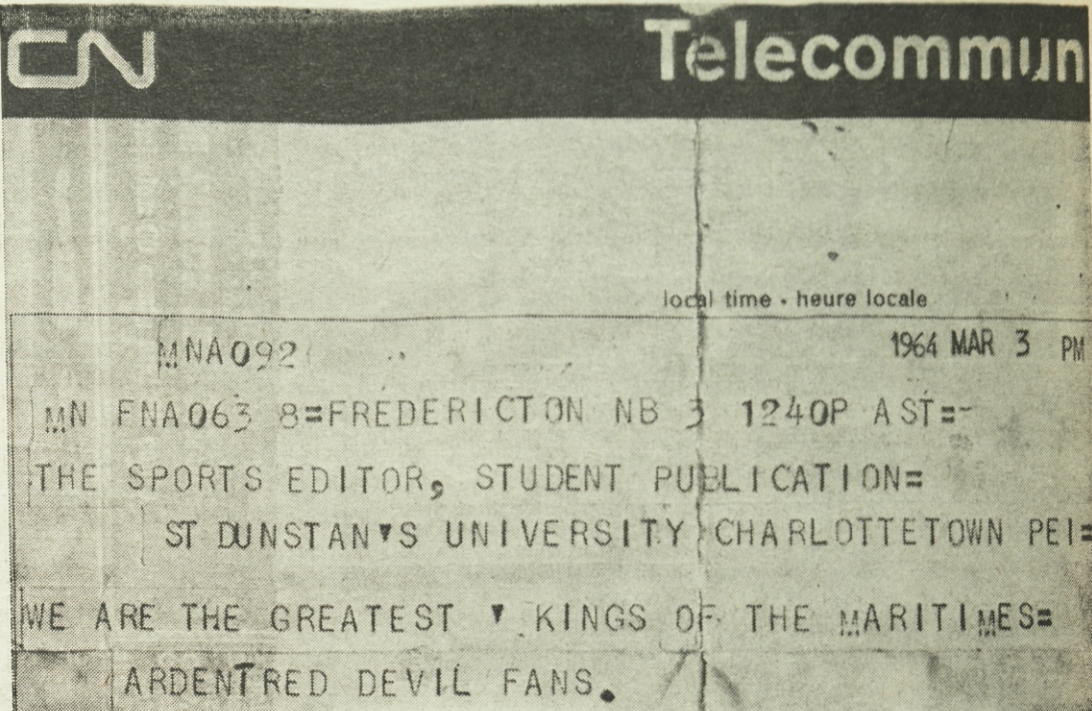
