The Visit of His Excellency, the Apostolic Delegate

What was our surprise and delight when we learned that His Excellency, Most Reverend Andrea Cassulo, Apostolic Delegate to Canada and Newfoundland, was to be the guest of St. Dunstan's! His Holiness, the Pope, has an abiding interest in Catholic education, and his representative, by these visits to Catholic Institutions of learning, is carrying out his requests and furthering his desires.

Accompanied by his secretary, Father Rousseau, he arrived at Borden on Saturday afternoon, and was met there by Rt. Reverend Dr. McLellan, V.G., Reverend Dr. Murphy, Reverend Dr. McMahon, and Reverend Walter McGuigan. They then proceeded by automobile to the Bishop's residence, where the distinguished Prelate was cordially welcomed by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan. On Sunday morning he arrived at the College where he was received with all the impressive solemnity of the Holy Catholic Church. After his reception, the Rector, Reverend Dr. Murphy, read to him a beautiful address, in which he bade him welcome, introduced him to the College, and gave expression to the filial devotion and unswerving loyalty of the students and faculty to the Holy Father. Before and after he had celebrated the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, His Excellency spoke in both English and French, introducing himself and explaining the purpose of his visit. He stressed the fact that the students of today are the citizens of tomorrow, and that on them depend the future of the Church, and the development of their country. After dinner His Excellency spoke further and said that he was much impressed with the reception accorded him, with the courtesy and behavior of the students, with the respect and esteem shown by the faculty, and with the conditions he had observed. In recognition of this he declared a holiday, for which he was loudly applauded.

At four o'clock we gathered in front of the main building to bid him good-bye. We gave him three rousing cheers. After which he again reminded us of our duties, wished us success, and gave us his blessing. He brought with him a message of paternal love and solicitude from the Vicar of Christ; he left behind that indescribable air of sanctity, of sincerity, that is characteristic of himself.

His Excellency, Bishop O'Sullivan, and the Rt. Reverend Dr. McLellan attended the banquet given at St. Dunstan's in honor of the Apostolic Delegate.

John T. Croteau of Worcester, Mass., arrived amongst us in the fall of 1933 to occupy the chair of Economics and Sociology at this university and Prince of Wales College. He received his M.A. from Clark University in 1933.
