It was in the year 1937 near the swelling waves of the Northumberland Strait that Desmond was born to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William McIvor.



RICHARD LOUIS POWER—ARTS


"But soon or late the man who wins

"I'm an American citizen and proud of the fact"


