"A good companion makes good company."






John Joseph Dunphy — Arts "I grow in learning as I grow in years."

"A merry heart maketh a cheerful countenance."






James Raymond Johnston — Commerce

#### Charles Armand Lambert — Arts







#### Gilles Normand — Arts


"Son, be like your Father and your Father's Father, a true disciple of Hippocrates."

"No crown but one of our own making is ours to wear."


