Senior Hockey

S. D. U.—1 Second Abbies—0

On Feb. 4, the boys of St. Dunstan's played their first hockey game of the season when they met the Second Abbies at the Arena. The Saints took the offensive from the start, setting a fast pace which they kept up throughout the fixture. O'Brien, Cassidy and Cullen on the forward line kept their opponents busy, but the work of Blanchard and Sherren on the Abbies defense, combined with the sensational goalkeeping of Collins, prevented our boys from scoring. For two exciting periods the teams fought furiously for a score without success, the Saints being saved time and again by White, who turned aside many shots that looked like sure goals. The work of Cote, our husky defense man, was sensational, and his rink-end rushes won the admiration of the fans.

The third period found both teams determined to score, yet for a time it was but a repetition of the first two periods. It looked as if the game was to end in a tie, when O'Brien, after a brilliant rush, scored the only goal of the evening on a long wing shot, shortly before the final whistle.

When only about one-half minute of the first period remained, Cote took the puck from behind his own net, and, with one of his sensational rushes, skated through the entire P. W. C. team and landed the puck behind McNutt for the first score. In the second period the Saints again scored, this time

The last period was practically all St. Dunstan's. Cote again started the scoring in this period with one of his usual end to end rushes. He was followed shortly by Cullen.
