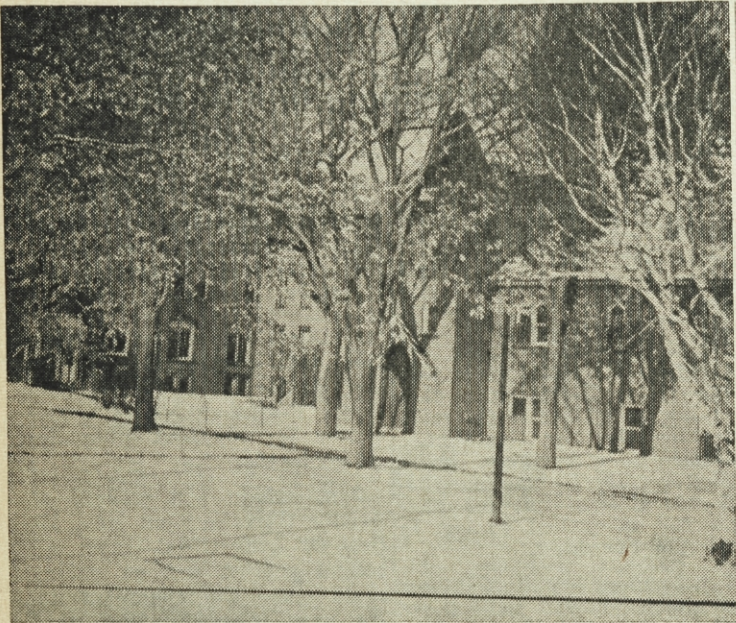


- FIRST SNOW -

Strip-Tease Artiste Helps W. U. S. Fund Drive

What does a stripper know
about economics?

A lot, it seems.

"The Economics of Over-Developed Areas" was the subject of a talk by strip-tease artiste Libby Jones at a "teach-in" organized last night by the University of Toronto committee of World University Service (WUS).

The "teach-in" was one of a number of stunts organized by Toronto WUS as part of their "SHARE" campaign to raise funds to help students in developing countries.

After her talk, Miss Jones was auctioned off to the highest bidder. She was won by a student syndicate which paid \$107. They then drew lots to decide who should show Miss Jones around the Toronto campus, take her to a restaurant for dinner, escort her back to the Victory Theatre (where she is currently appearing) and then help her don her sequins, etc., for her evening performance. The lucky student was Keith Large, a freshman at New College.

Miss Jones (the only stripper in the business with a B.A. - University of Washington) urged the co-eds in her audience to interpret their future B.A.'s as "bare anatomy" as she had done, to take to the boards and make up to \$250 a week.

The 75% ile is the average below which are 75% of the students in the group. The other percentile are interpreted similarly. At each percentile noted the Freshman marks are the best in three years. The 38% failure rate is also the least in three years for the Freshman. The Sophomores are better off than last year on all accounts, but not quite as well off as two years ago. The Juniors are about as well off as last year but not quite as well off as the year before, except for the failure rate which is about the same. The Seniors are not quite as well off at the 75% level as last year, but they are slightly better off at the 50% ile and 25% ile level and in the percent failed. They are quite as well off as the Seniors of 1963. In general, the marks are better off this November than last November but not quite as good as November '63, except for the Freshman marks which are better than in 1963 and 1964.

The failure rate for all years remains high. It would be interesting to know the cause of and remedies for this situation.

than \$2,000 in their one-week campaign. By the time all proceeds are in, the committee hopes to hit its target of \$15,000—roughly a dollar per student. This money will go to the WUS international "Programme of Action."

Projects in this programme include aid to refugee and stateless students; student health clinics and sanatoria; hostels, canteens and student centres; and co-operative printing projects, bookstores and lending libraries in more than thirty developing countries in Asia, Africa and Latin America.

A final word of advice to potential strippers from Libby Jones. "If you are planning to be a stripper", she said, "Do it now, while men and materials are available." With standards of morality slipping so rapidly, she added, men will soon be able "to get all this at home."
