Dr. O'Grady and the elements

On the snowy afternoon of Friday, April 5, Dr. Brendan A. O'Grady, M.A., Ph.D., who teaches English here at St. Dunstan's, in order to illustrate a passage from John Milton's *Paradise Lost*, caused a snowstorm to subside and the sun to break through the clouds.

While reading the great classic in the English 2B class on Friday afternoon, the students came upon certain lines which Dr. O'Grady thought should be clarified. In lines 488 to 495 of Book II, Milton compares the rejoicing in Hell at the conclusion of "their doubtful conclusions dark" to the joy felt on Earth when the sun manages at length to show itself after a storm. In order to impress upon the students' minds, Dr. O'Grady felt it was necessary to cause just such a happening. As he spoke, the sun-light beamed in through the window and gladdened the hearts of all present. Was it merely coincidental that the storm should stop so suddenly? Meteorological records show us that strange happenings do sometimes occur, but only very rarely.

Dr. O'Grady, who was thought by all to be a mild man, amazed his entire class when, in illustrating this passage, he made use of super-human powers which no one had ever realized he possessed. The fact is still debated whether these powers had lain latent in the man since his birth, or whether they had recently been bestowed upon him by that same Power Who gave Samson the stupendous strength to crush the Philistines. Because Dr. O'Grady too has devoted himself to crushing Philistines, we have a team of genealogical experts tracing his family tree to determine whether he might not in some way be related to this well-known biblical personage.
