MULLIGAN WILL BE MISSED

Over the past few years the Saint Dunstan's University hockey team has been blessed with many fine players. For a small college Saint Dunstan's can take pride in the fact that it ices a team of which any Canadian college would be proud. Four years ago Dick Tingley won the M.I.H.L. scoring title while wearing a Red and White uniform. Tingley set a league record for points the year he led the league.

Two seasons ago the Saints had Billy MacMillan. MacMillan stole the show in the M.I.H.L. by twice winning the M.V.P. award and the scoring championship. He is now a starting forward with the Canadian National Team.

The 1964-65 M.I.H.L. Champion Saint Dunstan's Saints also had Darrel Pollock. Pollock was, perhaps, the best defence-man in the league. He played a big part in the Saints success that season.

Denis DeCarufel, the fiery forward from Shawinigan Falls, was second leading scorer with the Saints for two seasons. DeCarufel won the hearts of the fans with his grim determination combined with his fine scoring ability.

Last season Maurice Roy set an M.I.H.L. goal scoring record. Roy, along with Chi Chi Farenza of X, broke Billy MacMillan's old record of 25 goals. Roy will be back next year but had he been playing this season the Saints might now be looking down at the X-Men in the standings.

Let no one forget Mike Kelly, the gentlemen's hockey player. Kelly, who is now in his last season, last year set a league record for most assists. He is the clearest thinking hockey player around and his good sportsmanship and fine hockey ability will surely be missed by the Saints next season.

There are players now with Saint Dunstan's who will leave their mark in the league before they depart. Players like Paul MacWilliams, Rick O'Donnell, and Allen Flood will certainly be talked about as stars of the league for the next few years.

However, the man most associated with Saint Dunstan's hockey team over the past five years is Vince Mulligan. This man has done more for hockey at S.D.U. than has anyone else.

Mulligan has been team captain over the past few seasons. His leadership is visible on the ice but it extends farther than that. He is the leader in all matters concerning the players.

As for hockey ability, no one will deny that Mulligan has been the backbone of the Saints defence since coming here. Converted from a forward to a defence-man because of a lack of safeguards on the club he has become one of the best in the circuit.

Next season Vince will not be with Saint Dunstan's. He has only one more home game in a Red and White uniform. That he will be missed next season is an understatement.

Take a good look at No. 8 next time for in him you will see determination and ability. Take a good look for it will be one of your last while he plays for the Saints. Take a good look because this kind of player doesn't pass S.D.U. every day.

On Thursday morning at 10 a.m. Saint Dunstan's goes against the Yukon. The last two games will probably be the Saints' most difficult ones.

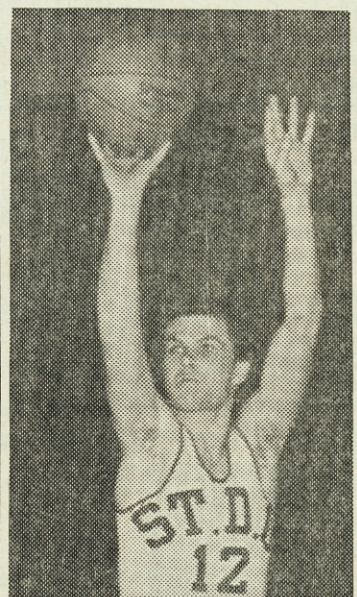

Saints Humble Xaverians; Lose To UNB Red Raiders And Mt. Allison

Ed Hilton's basketball Saints defeated the Saint Francis Xavier University X-Men Friday night before a capacity crowd in Alumni gymnasium. It was the Saint's second win in seven years against the Xaverians, and the first one at home.

St. F.X. drew first blood, scoring a quick basket off the opening tap. The Saints replied immediately to set the trend for most of the first half, no team taking a lead of more than 2 or 3 points at any point.

This sort of see-saw battle went on until there were five minutes remaining in the first half, when the Saints started to pour it on, to go ahead by 11 at intermission. Score at the half, 63-52.

The second half started much the same as the first, but it lasted for less than five minutes. The Xaverians seemed to fall apart, while the Saints could do no wrong.

X's big gun, John Gabriel got into foul trouble early in the game, and sat out most of the second half. He didn't return until the Saints were ahead by 25.

It was a team effort for the Saints, as all five starters hit double figures. Dan Theriault played a sparkling game, scoring 32 to put him into first place in the MIBL scoring race. The Saints diminutive 5'7" forward, Ronnie Diamond, played the finest game of his life as he matched Theriault's output. Diamond led the squad in shooting percentage with a phenomenal 60.8.

Owen Jay came through with another big game, potting 29. In the first half he set up at least ten baskets for his teammates, while scoring only eight. In the second half of the contest he continued his fine play-making, but scored 21 on his own.

Eddie Lawlor continued his amazing rebounding as he hauled 18 off the boards. Lawlor is 5'10". The men he faced were 6'4". When he wasn't rebounding, he scored 11 points.

Mike Sullivan celebrated his return to form after a recent slump by scoring 18 points. He did it playing on an ankle he had sprained in Thursday's practice.

The whole story may have been told in the shooting percentages of the two teams. The Saints had the amazingly high average of 53.2% from the floor, while the Xaverians had a low 40%.

Referees Fred Ripley and Jim Fox called a total of 34 fouls, 14 of them against the Saints.

WINLESS IN FOUR STARTS

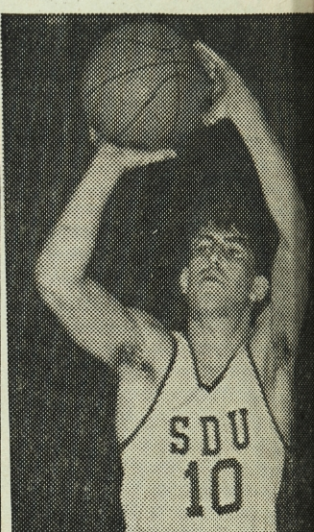
Friday's win gave the Saints a 3-1 record at home, but they are having problems away. So far they have been winless in four starts on the road. Last weekend they lost to the UNB Red Raiders in Fredericton, as they helped prove the seemingly true legend that the Raiders can't be beaten on their home court.

The Saints played their worst game of the season in Fredericton, losing 88-59. Dan Theriault was the lone bright spot on the P.E.I. squad, scoring 29 points. He received a trophy honoring him as most valuable player in the game. The rest of the Saints turned in a disappointing performance, with the possible exceptions of Owen Jay who scored 15, and Mike Sullivan who shone on defence.

The day after the UNB game the Saints travelled to Sackville to face the previously winless Mt. A. Hawks. It was winter carnival time at Mount Allison, and the men in the striped jerseys provided what must have been the most humorous entertainment of the weekend. It wasn't so humorous to the SDU squad as they went down 97-84.

Dan Theriault was high man for the Saints in the fiasco with 31. Jay followed closely with 30. As has been said before, and will be said again, "The Saints have the two best guards in the league," or to quote an overheard conversation in Sackville, "They're mid-levels, but they're good, damned good".

The weekend before the New Brunswick trip, the Saints hosted the Acadia University Axemen. Acadia, last year's Maritime champs, were expected to handle the much smaller Saints with ease. As it turned out, the Saints had little trouble handling the Acadians. The SDU squad took an early lead in the third quarter that the Axemen could not overcome until there were only five minutes left in

the game.

At that point the Axemen went ahead by four. The Saints regained control a few seconds later to finish five points ahead of their opponents. Final score was 99-94.

Theriault and Jay were again the scoring leaders for the Saints, with 33 and 27 respectively. This game saw a team effort, as Ronnie Diamond and Mike Sullivan contributed 17 and 14.

With his 32 point output in the X game, Theriault takes over first place in the Maritime league scoring. SMU's Jim Daniels is a close second, while the other half of the Saint's scoring twins Owen Jay is third, and closing the gap.

The Saints' record now stands at 3-5, which puts them into fourth place in the seven team loop. Their next home game is against the U.N.B. Red Raiders Friday night in Alumni Gymnasium.
