The demise of the former was due to appendicitis; but "Sam" fell a victim to the dreaded Influenza. Both of these young men were members of the same class, and the students in general, but especially their former classmates, miss their companionship. Since last issue of "Red and White" two more St. Dunstan's men have been killed in Action in the persons of Bdr. Wilfrid McKenna of the 5th Siege Battery Draft, and Pte. We who knew them before they left this country and especially, we who were associated with them in college and therefore in a position to know their characters, feel confident that their souls are at rest.

The Spanish Influenza claimed another member of our Alumni in the person of Earl Grady, who died at his home in Summerside, in October last. Mr. Grady was a student here some years ago and was one of the best hockey players that St. Dunstan's ever produced. He was a clever and popular student and his many friends here and elsewhere learned with deep regret of his death which took place in the prime of manhood.

Still another o the men of whom St. Dunstan's has just reason to be proud has passed away. Dr. R. A. Donahue, who made his Classical course here; died at his home in Regina, Sask., on November 29th, '18. We have no hesitation in saying that Robert Donahue was one of the best athletes that ever donned the colors for old St. Dunstan's. But it was not only on the football field that he was successful for he was an intelligent student and the success which he attained in his profession is due to his own earnest endeavor.
