

## ATHLETICS

With the dawn of a world at peace flooding the shadows of five long years of war, the outlook for every peacetime activity becomes brighter. And so for athletics, a true symbol of peace with its encouragement of the high ideals of fair play, we can see a bright future. To treat in any detail the athletic accomplishments of St. Dunstan's during the war years would indeed be beyond my ability. The only complete and accurate record can be found in the heroic deeds of our students who "Took the khaki and the gun instead of cap and gown".

In time of war when our very existence is threatened few have time for any real organized competitive sport. This fact with its attendant restrictions on men, materials, and travel made it impossible for the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union to carry on with pre-war schedules. As a result of these restrictions, the past five years saw exhibition games predominating Maritime Intercollegiate competition.

The first post-war meeting of the M. I. A. U. was held in Truro in September of this year. The only outcome of the meeting which warrants particular mention here is the adoption of a new system to determine the Maritime Intercollegiate football champions. Under this system each province must determine its own provincial champion. This means that St. Dunstan's automatically becomes Island Intercollegiate Champion and meets the New Brunswick Champion in a two game total point series. The winner is then to meet the Nova Scotia Champion in the finals.

A hockey schedule is to be drawn up at a meeting to be held in Sackville immediately after the Christmas holidays.

### SENIOR TEAM

Saturday October 13th, gave home fans their first chance to see the senior Saints in action as they walked through P. W. C. to the tune of 17-3.



From the starting whistle Saints pushed their opponents back to their ten yard line where the play remained for the greater part of the first half. On three occasions in this session Saints crossed the tape. The first break came when Green, elusive wingman, raced forty five yards to go over standing up. At a difficult angle the kick for the extra points was short. The fifteen minute mark saw veteran J. McAdam pick a loose ball and plunge over the P. W. C. line to make it 6-0 for the Saints. The attempted kick was again off the mark. In the dying minutes of the first half "Cart" MacDonald, speedy S. D. U. half line man, marked up the third try for the Saints. "Duck" MacDonald made no mistake on the convert and the first half ended with the Saints leading 11-0.

The early part of the second half saw P. W. C. holding the Saints on even terms and their only score of the game came when "Brick" Gormley plunged across his former team mates' line to gather in the loose ball. The attempted kick was short. Five minutes later "Sock" O'Hanley made it 14-3 for the Saints. In the dying minutes of the game Mike Hennessey fell on a loose ball dribbled across the P. W. C. line. The game ended in a 17-3 victory for the Saints.

Maritime Intercollegiate semi-finals got under way at Fredericton, October 27th, with the Saints taking a 6-0 defeat administered by U. N. B. With a strong crosswind behind them U. N. Fighting back desperately the Saints pushed their heavier opponents deep into their own territory. The play seesawed back and forth until midway through the first half when Bell of U. N. B. grabbed the ball from a two yard scrum to go over the Saints' line. The attempted convert failed. The remainder of the first session saw the Saints pressing desperately for a try but they were unable to break through the U. N. B. last ditch defense. Snappy ball handling by Cameron, S. D. U. fullback, kept the play out of the Saints' territory.

Early in the second half Len MacDonald, hardworking Saints' heeler, was forced out of the game with a head injury. The Saints were on the defensive for most of this half as U. N. B., plunging from the numerous lineups pressed hard for a tally. Again Cameron's fine work saved the day for the Saints as he kicked to safety on many occasions.

With only five minutes left to play McDermid of the Hillmen, picking a cleanly heeled ball from the five yard scrum, hit pay dirt for U.N.B. The convert was short. The game ended with U. N. B. leading by six points in the semi-finals.
