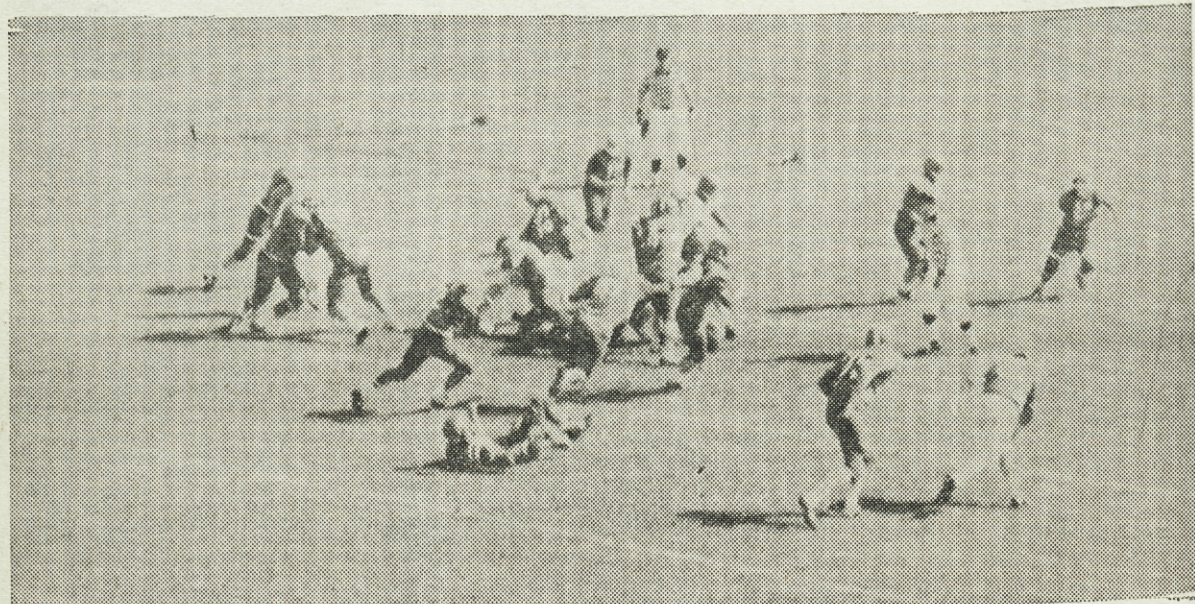


SAINTS TAKE MEASURE OF TIGERS IN LEAGUE OPENER

For the second consecutive year the St. Dunstan's University Saints, led by Jim Foley, defeated the Dalhousie Tigers in the Saints' league opener, this year to the tune of 25-13. Foley ran for two touchdowns himself and sent CY MacDonald over for another. Rookie Jack Sands threw to end Jim Burke for the Saints' other major.

Dalhousie's rookie quarterback Dave Montagnano had a hand in both their touchdowns as he lugged the ball across the line for one and passed to Cooper for the second Dal major.

The Saints offence looked sharp, particularly in the first half as they struck for three majors while the Tigers could muster only a single point. Except for a lapse in the third quarter the defence held up very well against the heavier Dal team.

In the first quarter, Dal kicked off and S.D.U. received the ball on their own 30 yard line. Then a pass to end Jimmy Burke together with carries by LaJeunesse and Driscoll brought the ball to the Dal 10 yard line. Foley then sent halfback CY MacDonald over for the touchdown at the 5:10 mark of the first quarter. The convert at-

tempt by Driscoll was good.

Three minutes later the Saint's Jim Foley recovered a Dalhousie fumble and on the next play handed off to halfback Jack Sands who passed to Burke in the end zone for the second major of the afternoon. The convert attempt was unsuccessful.

Late in the first quarter the Tigers got their only point of the first half as St. Dunstan's got trapped behind their own goal line.

The first fourteen minutes of the second quarter were scoreless as both teams battled in the mud around midfield. Dal's best scoring opportunity of first half came in this quarter as they advanced the ball to the S.D.U. 15 yard line. However, alert playing by Kinsella, McGuire, and Gene MacDonald kept the Tigers from crossing the scrimmage line.

Driscoll received Dal's punt following this play and the Red and White march toward their third touchdown of the half was on. In this drive quarterback Foley, on two different occasions, bootlegged for a first down, on third and two situations. Then with thirty-six seconds remaining in the half Foley on a quar-

terback sneak crossed the goal line to make the score read 19-1.

The Red and White defence slackened in the third quarter due to the fact that several key men were beginning to feel the pressure of going both ways. At the 8:55 mark Montagnano got Dal's first touchdown of the afternoon. Late in the same quarter Montagnano passed to Cooper for the second Dal major.

The Saint Dunstan's defence got their second wind in the final quarter and the Tigers were kept off the score sheet for the remainder of the game.

With four minutes left to play Jim Foley scored the insurance TD as he crossed the line with the aid of beautiful blocking by several Saints' players.

When asked to comment on the game, coach Hilton had this to say — "Except for a few mistakes which can be corrected, I was quite satisfied with our defense. We could have done better in the second half if some key men hadn't been so tired from going both ways. The outlook is very good as we have something good going for us this years."

S.D.U. TRACK TEAM PREPARES FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE MEET

On October 18, the 1967 edition of the S.D.U. Track and Field team will compete in the Maritime Intercollegiate Track and Field Tournament at Dalhousie. This year's team, under head coach Marshall Conley, has been in an intensive training program for the past week in preparation for the meet. This will mark the 2nd year that S.D.U. has ventured into this phase of varsity athletics and already they are building up a formidable team. This fall Conley hopes to take over a team of 10 men. The nucleus of the team will be built around four veteran track men, Bill MacKinnon, Andy Arsenault, Chris Annett, and Joe Cheverie. Bill MacKinnon, no stranger to Maritime track and field

circles will compete in the 100 and 200. MacKinnon, last year's winner of the 100 yard dash, also holds the Island record for 100 in 9.8 seconds.

The distance man on the team will be Andy Arsenault, Maritime track star of a few years ago. Andy holds practically every distance record in the Maritimes and a good deal of team hopes lie in his performance at the meet. If he can get back into shape he will pick up valuable points for S.D.U. in the 440 and 1/2 mile.

Expected to bring points to S.D.U. in the high jump is Joe Cheverie, probably the top high jumper in the Maritimes, who holds the Eastern Canadian midget record for the high jump.

Throwing the javelin for S.D.U. and also performing in broad and high jump is Chris Annett.

When asked about his team's chances Coach Conley stated "we will be right in there and with a little luck we could win the Maritime championship". Last year the Red & White team sent only two men to the meet and they came out ahead of Mount A. which had a full team.

Since Track and Field is a relatively new sport at S.D.U. there is very little interest among our students. However, if the Saints come up with a good showing on the 18th, it could do a lot to heighten the interest of the student body in our Red & White squad.

This afternoon Jim Foley piloted the Saints to their first league victory of this year. There is no doubt, students, we are headed for our most successful season yet in football. Centers, guards, tackles, ends, backfield, linebackers, quarterback — all played their hearts out in defeating the Tigers.

Jim Foley passed, handed off, rolled out and lugged the ball through the line for 60 muddy minutes. When the final gun sounded, he not only had sent Burke and CY over for T.D.'s but he also crossed the line for two T.D.'s himself. Foley also saw service on defence and made several key tackles at corner linebacker position — a tremendous performance all told.

Jerry LaJeunesse, playing his first of what is hoped will be many excellent games for the S.D.U. gridiron squad, was a standout both on offence and defence. Going both ways and playing as well as Jerry did requires great stamina and ability. In this game he had an abundance of both.

For those of you who didn't see the game, St. Dunstan's has their own version of Dick Bucktas on the Red and White squad. He is none other than Dermie Kinsella. Time and time again Dermie charged in from his middle linebacker position to break up Dal plays before they could become dangerous. As the result of a bone crunching tackle by Dermie, in the second quarter, Lewiston, one of Dal's top backfield men saw limited action for the remainder of the game.

The Tigers quarterback, "Mighty" Montagnano, as their program labelled him, didn't prove to be so mighty as four of his passes were intercepted by S.D.U. Two of them were pulled down by Norbie Bartholomew. Grabbing another was Bo Bo Driscoll who probably played the finest game of his career with the Saints. Snatching a fourth one from the hands of a Dal receiver was Jim Burke. Burke played a fine game, going both ways, and also picked up a T.D.

Also playing good ball for S.D.U. in the backfield were Jack Sands and CY MacDonald. CY lugged the piskin several times for valuable yardage and got the Saints first major. In addition to carrying the ball (one hand) Sands showed his ability for throwing the ball as he passed to Burke for a T.D. in the first quarter.

Playing his usual fine game for the Saints while being bothered by a bad ankle was Owen Jay. According to the Dal program they have two linemen by the name of "impregnable" Ironsides and "Stalwart" Webber. However, they proved not to be either very stalwart or impregnable as our linemen Clarkson, Hickey, Hubley, and Zewski smashed through them, clearing holes for our backfielders.

Turning in a fine performance from the defensive end position was Joe MacQuire, who in my opinion is one of the most underrated players on the Saints squad.

Sophomore Cletus Dunn turned in a fine performance at his defensive half position as did Leon Berrourd and Bob Kane. On the defensive line Albert MacDonald and Vince Fisher turned in fine performances. Several times throughout the game Fisher prevented Dal from picking up long yardage with his bone-crunching tackles.

This appraisal of the game would be far from complete if tribute was not paid to coaches Hilton and Kane. They are the masterminds behind every play. The success of every game and every season depends a great deal on the skill of our coaches and in the game last Saturday Hilton and Kane outscored Dal's Harvey Scott all the way.
