In years long since past its popularity among the boys placed it upon a pinnacle, from which it has never been moved. This year has been no exception. From last year's squads, badly depleted by graduation, a senior team was formed; and new and capable men eagerly filled the vacancies left by the promotion of the Intermediates.

This 1933 season has been a crowning success. The senior fifteen have for the third successive year won the Senior Rugby Championship of the Island, while the Intermediates have returned with the Provincial Inter-

mediate title.

Although much praise is due to the teams for the excellent work and sportsmanship shown during the season, nevertheless, something would be lacking if we did not thank and compliment our coach, Fr. W. J. McGuigan, for the interest he has shown in, and success he has had with, the teams.

Senior Football

It was with deep regret that St. Dunstan's learned that the Abbies, their ancient and always formidable rivals, for almost the first time in thirty-three years would be absent from senior football circles. Despite this fact, however, a three team league was successfully organized. Prince of Wales College and the Charlottetown Naval Reserves entered teams in the senior league. The early fall of snow hampered the activities of the league to some extent but St. Dunstan's retained, for another year, the Island title.

The season was opened by an exhibition game with P. W. C. in which St. Dunstan's was defeated. The game, for the most part, produced ragged ball in which many fumbles and much high tackling played a prominent part.

Play began slowly in the first half. The *Red* and *Blue* squad heeled the ball with regularity from their slightly heavier opponents. Pressing steadily forward, they forced the Saints to their twenty-five yard line, and from a scrim, a P. W. C. back scored the first try of the game. It was converted. From this time on the *Red* and *White* fifteen kept the City collegians busy. Late in the period as a result of a scrum in P. W. C. territory the Saints cracked the city's defense for the final try of the game. It was unconverted and a few minutes later the period ended.

In the second half the Saints put new life into the game but were met by a stubborn defense. The Red and Blue squad threatened seriously but once, and play was largely confined to their territory. Many fumbles in the Red and White backfield ruined their chances of adding to the score. The period ended with the Saints forcing the play.

St. Dunstan's opened the City Rugby League with a win over P. W. C. The *Red* and *White* clad boys excelled in combination and this proved to be the deciding factor of the game.

The Saints got away to a fast start and a relieved P. W. C. squad saw Owen find touch, deep in S. D. U. territory. With the wind at their backs, the City collegians were stopped several times when within striking distance of the Saints' goal line. With a minute to go the St. Dunstan's boys opened the scoring with a nice bit of backfield work. The attempt at goal failed, and the

whistle halted proceedings.

In the last half the Saints pressed steadily and although the City collegians threatened on two occasions the attack of the Saints was too strong to be held off indefinitely. In this period they added two more trys, both of which were converted. The *Red* and *Blue* squad were beaten for they could not cope with the smooth passing attack of the victors, who were still masters of the situation as the game ended.

The *Red* and *White* team won their second league victory when they turned back the Naval Reserves in a hard-fought battle. The Saints scrum heeled well and their backfield produced some smart passing attacks.

The S. D. U. squad kicked off to open the game and for a few minutes the Navy boys kept the play in *Red* and *White* territory. Well placed kicks soon brought the play deep into Navy territory. From a resulting scrum the Saints scored their first try which was converted. For the rest of the period the Navy put up an iron clad defense on their five yard line which the Collegians failed to pierce.

In the second half, the Reserves rushed matters, and kept the *Red* and *White* squad on their toes. But as the period wore on, the superior condition of the Saints began to tell. They scored on a penalty kick and a try which was converted. The *Red* and *White* team had little difficulty in keeping the Navy in check for the rest of the game,

which ended in a victory for the Saints by 11 to 0.

On account of the treacherous footing both teams resorted to dribbling tactics. For this reason territorial advantage changed frequently in the early stages of the game. P. W. C. opened the scoring early, when their outside half dodged thirty yards to score a well-earned try. The Saints forced the *Red* and *Blue* team for the remainder of the period during which our senior fifteen scored as the result of a long dribble. The attempt at goal was successful.

In the final half the *Red* and *White* forwards followed up to good advantage, and the backs, now used to the strange field, were more effective both defensively and offensively. The *Red* and *White* team scored two more trys, both of which were converted. Shortly after the whistle sounded, and another chapter in Island football was completed.
