

SENIOR DEBATING SOCIETY.

The Senior Classes met on December 6th for the purpose of re-organizing the St. Thomas Literary and Debating Society. Mr. Henri Crepeau was appointed chairman. After the object of the meeting was explained to the new students. The bright prospects for the coming year were pointed out by many of last years parlimentarians. As last years constitution and By-laws were not available, it was necessary to draw up a new constitution and Bye-laws. Some lengthy speeches were made and many and varied suggestions as to what these new rules should contain. It was

finally left to the committee to draw up the required constitution and present it at the next meeting for adoption. The Meeting then adjourned.

The second meeting of the society was held on Thursday December 10th. The constitution and bye-laws as drawn up by the Committee, were read and adopted. After a rather lengthy discussion it was decided that the proceedings of the year should take the form of a Mock Parliament with a few ordinary debates put on throughout the year, the time these debates shall be held to be left to the discretion of the Moderator.

The Division of the members was submitted to and approved of by the society.

Immediately after adjournment each party held a caucas and elected their leaders. Messrs Henri Crepeau and Owen C. Trainor two of the ablest speakers of last years parliament were elected to lead the respective parties. It was agreed upon that Mr. Crepeau and his party should be the first to form a Government.

Hon. Joseph R. Flemming-Minister of Railways and Canals.

Hon. George Morrison-Minister of Agriculture. Hon. Philip J. Mellady - Minister of Labor.

Edward McLellan-Secretary of State.

Hon. Francis Clark, Hon. Earl Cahill, Hon. Michael McIntyre, ministers without Portfolio.

The opening of the house took place on Thursday December 17th, and was accompanied by the usual military ceremonies. The speech from the throne was read by His Excellence Rev. Owen Kiggins and contained many important questions.

It is expected that there will be some very interesting debates during the coming session of Parliament, for both parties possess members who are already well known for their oratorical qualities. There are also a few newcomers, who are reported to be very eloquent, and with a little experience, they may make things interesting for some of our older members. Considerable interest is being shown in the proceedings this year, by all the members of the society.
