The C. F. C. C. S. conference was held this year at St. Thomas' College, Chatham, N. B. The Delegates from S. D. U., Allan Callaghan, F. A. Brennan, and Owen Sharkey were accompanied by the faculty advisor, Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley. The general topic of discussions, "The Cultural Formation of the Catholic Student" was viewed under the following sub-topics, "Paganism in Modern Literature and its Presence in Catholic Colleges," "What the Catholic Attitude Towards Reading Should Be," "How the Catholic Attitude Towards Reading Can Be Formed."

Rt. Rev. J. A. Murphy, D. D., has announced that the college will close earlier than usual this year so that the students, who are anxious to help in the war effort may help to relieve the manpower shortage in Canada. This change, which is welcomed by the students, will enable them to offer more assistance at home on the farm, and to assist in Canada's war production plan by working in her shipyards and munitions factories. To compensate for this curtailment of the student year the usual eighteen day Christmas holiday will be reduced to two weeks.

The entire student body were in attendance at a meeting at Notre Dame Convent Hall, Friday Night, October 2nd, to hear an address given by the Rev. Daniel A. Lord, S. J., on Catholic Action. A noted lecturer and writer, Father Lord comes from St. Louis, Missouri, where he is associated with "Queen's Work." He was invited by the Maritime Catholic Educational Association to visit the Maritimes on a lecture tour. Owing to his inability to stay in the city more than one day, plans are being made to have Father Lord return to St. Dunstan's for several days at a future date.

On Monday night, November 2nd, Reverend Desmond Stringer of the China Missionary Seminary, Scaraboro Bluffs, Ont., delivered to the students an entertaining and enlightening address on the Missions in China. Father Stringer, who spent twelve years in China previous to his return to Canada last year, has learned much concerning the customs and history of the Chinese people.

The Students' regular Thursday afternoon socials are being held again this year at the Holy Name Hall. The students are thankful to the Ladies' Committee, which has been a great factor towards the success of these socials.

St. Dunstan's Glee Club, which met with so much favor last year, has again been reorganized and is under the capable leadership of Lionel La France. We sincerely hope that it maintains the high standard which it set for itself last year.

THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

The Extension department of St. Dunstan's University, under the direction of Rt. Rev. J. A. Murphy, is continuing its educational work among the fishermen and the farmers of the province. Already one Extension course has been given to the fishermen and the farmers of Cardigan and vicinity. About forty students attended the course, and the public meetings, held in the evening, were well attended.

Three other courses are scheduled for the winter months at Murray Harbor, Tignish, and Wellington. The Extension department of St. Dunstan's University is assisted by members of the Extension department of St. Francis Xavier University, by the Dominion Department of Fisheries, and by the Provincial and Federal Departments of Agriculture. The purpose of the course is to stimulate study among the rural people of the province, to examine the present social and economic systems, and above all to help the people to help themselves.

Recently a detachment from Debert, comprising a subsection of Artillery and two universal carriers, gave an interesting demonstration on the campus for the benefit of the members of the C. O. T. C. The Artillery unit consisted of two 25-pounders of the modern type, and the two gun crews put on a very fine exhibition of gun laying. The officer in charge very kindly explained the working of the gun to those present. The Bren carriers also were put through their paces and showed what they could do over a particularly rough piece of testing ground near the college.

IN MEMORIAM

One of the older alumni, D. J. MacDonald, passed away in May last. He was a renowned athlete in his day and a familiar figure at all our football games.

The sad news reached us recently of the death in Abbotsford, B. C., on Oct. 4th of Rev. Daniel F. White. It was comparatively late in life when Fr. White turned his efforts to higher education. All admired the determination and fortitude with which be pursued his high school, college, and seminary courses. The difficulties and trials were such as would frustrate one with less faith and courage than Fr. Dan. He was victorious over them all, and was ordained in June 1935 for Vancouver Diocese. He labored at the Cathedral there, at Princeton and later at Abbotsford, where he died. Only seven years was allotted him in the priesthood, but we feel that the zeal of this sterling man of God must have earned him bounteous reward from his Divine Master. May he rest in peace.
