ATHLETICS

In order that a student may have good, vigorous health to aid him in his mental endeavours, he must take part in the sports and outdoor activities which constitute the physical side of college life. These athletic contests, if entered into with the proper spirit, besides strengthening the body of the student, develop his mind and character, and it is invariably in the ranks of participants of such games that one finds the most active and energetic men.

At St. Dunstan's it is so arranged that every student may take part in at least one form of sport. If he has not sufficient ability or experience to procure him a berth on a senior team, he is always given a chance to play in the intermural games, and, indeed, it is in these games

that many of our best athletes are developed.

Of the different forms of athletic activity in which our students engage, football is the most important. About a week after the re-opening of college first and second teams were reorganized. Both these teams had lost very heavily of last year's players, but the new men, under the capable direction of our coach, Rev. Fr. Mullally, rapidly rounded into shape and were soon able to take their places in the line-up with the more seasoned players.

Although our senior team lost the championship to the Abegweits, they put up a splendid fight in every game and only when they saw that their best was not sufficient did they accept defeat. The series between our second team and Prince of Wales College team was also a hard-

fought one.

Our boys failed to win back the intercollegiate title, but staged a struggle in both games of which they may be justly proud. In the intermural league, also, there was keen competition for first honors.

Senior Football

Abegweits—11 S.D.U.—6

The football season was auspiciously opened on Saturday, Oct. 5, when the Saints and Abegweits met for an exhibition game at the Abegweit grounds. The city team forced the issue from the beginning, and aided by a strong wind, brought the play to St. Dunstan's twenty-

five yard line. Here McMillan secured the ball in a scrum and crossed the Red and White line for the first try. On the kick-off the Abbies repeated their former tactics, and, after several scrimmages near the Saints' line, were rewarded with three more points. St. Dunstan's forwards followed hard on the ball when it was again put into play, and brought it to the city team's ten-yard line. In a desperate attempt to prevent a score, the Abbies punted to Murphy, who caught the ball, zigzagged his way through the opposing backfield, and crossed the line for the Saints' first try. The Abbies, not to be out-done, again took the offensive, and after several minutes went over the Saints' line for a try that was converted. This ended the scoring in the first half.

In the second half, the Saints, fearing defeat, followed up on the ball with such vigor that the Abbies were forced to play on the defensive the greater part of the time. The determined efforts on the part of the collegians were finally rewarded when their half-line, having received the ball from the line-up, relayed it to Murphy who crossed the Abbies' line for the second time. This was the last score of the game, for, when play was resumed, neither team could make any marked headway into enemy territory, and the game ended with the ball in centerfield.

Abbies—6 S.D.U.—3

The first game of the Island series took place on Saturday, Oct. 19, when the Saints went down to defeat before the fast-travelling Abbies. Honors were about even as far as territory was concerned, but the city aggregation took the lead near the beginning of the game, when Partridge picked up a loose ball and raced through St. Dunstan's territory for the first try. This play seemed to stimulate the Saints to greater efforts, for, following the kick-off, they rushed the play into their opponents'

field and, after several desperate scrimmages, Monaghan bucked his way through the opposing forces to even the count. The try was not converted and the first period

ended with the score 3—3.

In the second half the Abbies forced their way into Red and White territory. The Saints halted their advance momentarily by dribbling the ball out of the danger zone, but the Abbies were not to be denied. They met this onset with a counter attack which again brought them within scoring distance. Here Partirdge secured the pigskin and skirted the Saints' scrum to cross the line for the second Abegweit tally. A fighting St. Dunstan's team swept onward immediately after this and, by clever passing and team-work on the part of the half-line, brought the scene of dispute to the city team's two-yard line. The Abbies put up a stubborn defense, however, and gradually forced the collegians back, so that when the final whistle blew, play was on a more even basis. W. J. McDonald refereed.

Play in the second half was very much similar to that displayed in the first thirty minutes. Both teams menaced on different occasions, but a scoring punch was lacking in each attack. However, considering the condition of the field, the game throughout was exciting, and wonderful defensive tactics were displayed on both sides.

Abbies—9 S.D.U.—3

The third and final game of the league took place on Saturday, Nov. 2, when the Abegweits won the Island Championship by defeating St. Dunstans 9—3. This game, on the whole, did not compare favorably with the preceding ones, for there was too much kicking and individual play on both sides. The Saints departed, to some extent, from their usual passing game, depending more on bucking tactics, but a heavier Abegweit scrum offset, on nearly every occasion, dangerous threats of this method of attack. The only score in the first period came when Woolner, taking a pass on the Saints' five-yard line, forced his way through the latter's ranks for a try. In the second half the Saints put more spirit in the game, but their best efforts were not sufficient to keep the Abbies from scoring five minutes after the kick-off. The collegians, determined not to be shut out, now forged ahead, and, after a series of hard scrimmages, Fraser crossed the line for his team's only score. Shortly before the closing whistle the Abbies again tallied, when one of their forwards, going at full speed, picked up a loose ball and placed it directly between the posts.
