#### FOOTBALL

on general enrollment for talent; there is no indication of change for next year." Fr. Ledwell goes on, "Things won't improve much next year. There are a few hopeful aspects but nothing definite. There are a few high school players that have shown promise."

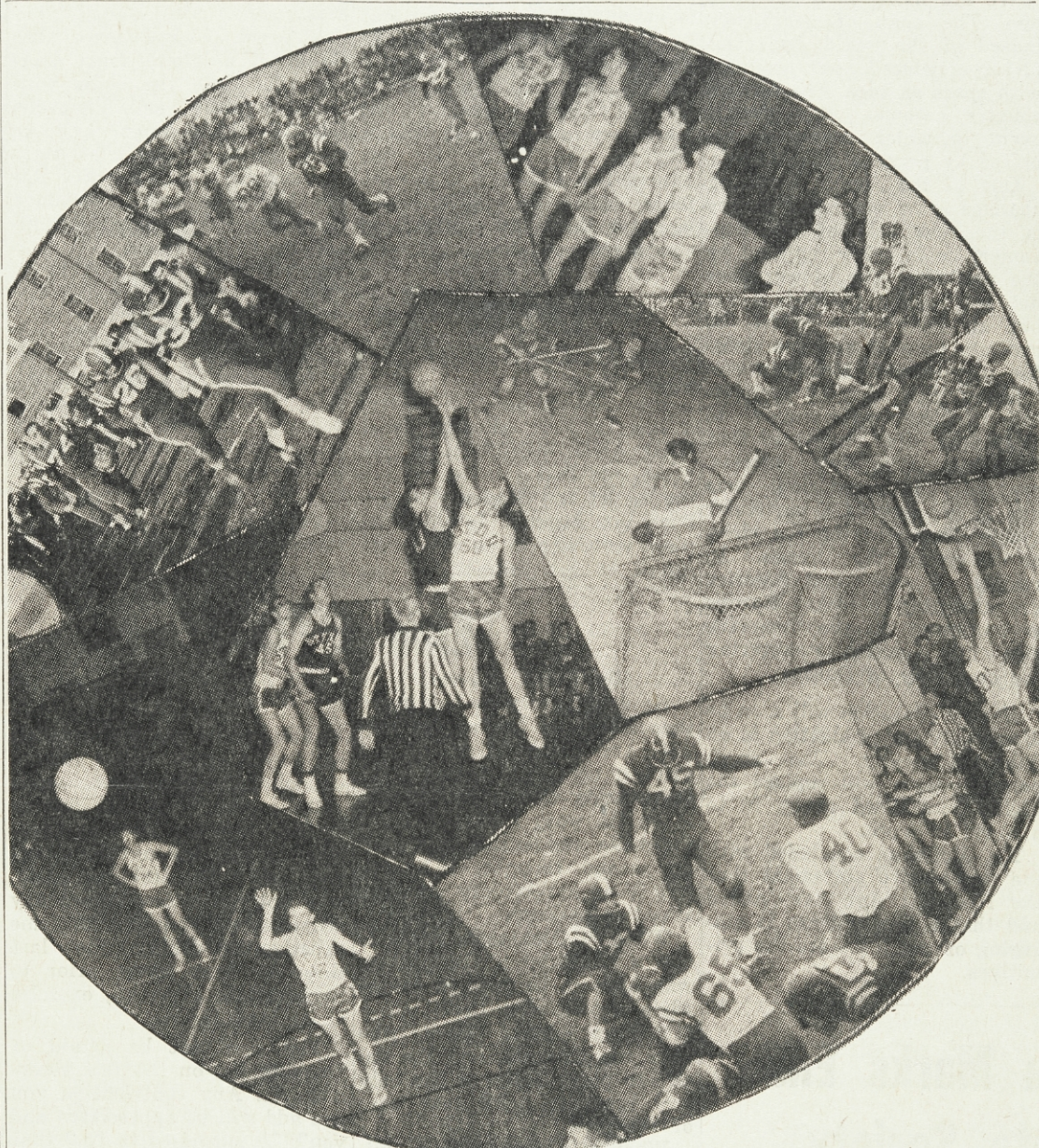

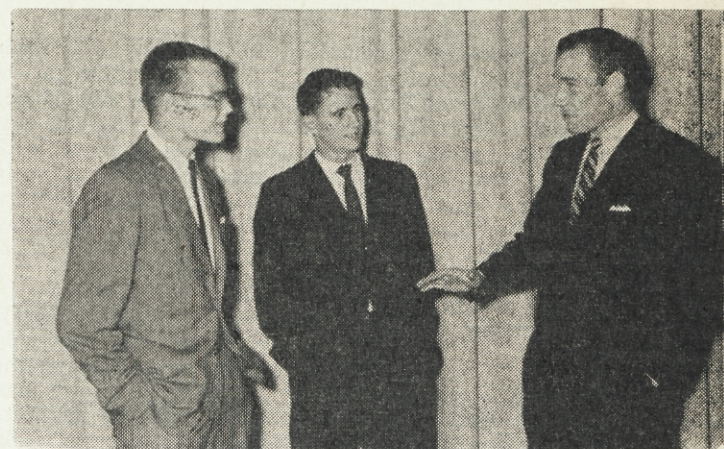
Bob Simmons — Fullback.

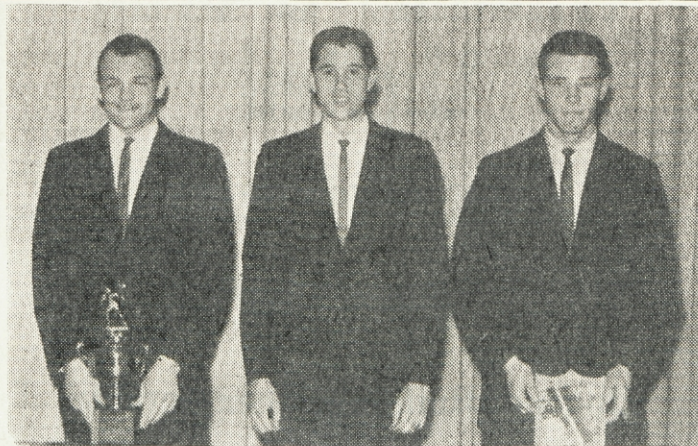
## AAA Executive Elected For 1962 - 1963
